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Houston, Texas:

City of Space and Diversity



Four and a half million people of over 100 different nationalities call Houston their home, and 75 foreign Consulates are housed in this city. Dubbed "Space City", Houston is also home to the **Johnson Space Center and NASA** – the command center for all NASA space flights since 1965. All American Astronauts are trained there.

Located on the upper Gulf Coast, the Houston metro area covers 8778 square miles – 8 times the size of Rhode Island. Houston boasts 293 parks. It has the 4th largest airport system in the U.S. and the 6th largest in the world. Three commercial airports are **Bush Intercontinental, WP Hobby Airport, and Ellington Field**, serving 150 markets worldwide. The average temperature in November is 72/50, so there is no need to bring winter coats.

A truly multi-cultural city, there are over 500 cultural, visual and performing arts organizations with 90 devoted to multi-cultural venues. The **Houston Grand Opera**, and **Houston Ballet** are the 5th largest companies in the U.S.; **Houston Symphony** is the oldest in Texas. Five professional sports teams call Houston home: **The Houston Astros (MLB), Rockets (NBA), Comets (WNBA), Texans (NFL), and Aeros (AHL)**.

Food cuisines from 35 countries and all U.S. regions are available at over 11,000 restaurants, and the average meal is under \$18. Travel is easy via the **Metro Bus Line**, and taxi.

Galveston and the Kemah Boardwalk are only minutes away from downtown Houston and feature the show stopping **Moody Gardens, Aquarium, and Rainforest and Discovery Pyramids**; and the fascinating **Lone Star Flight and the Railroad Museums**. Take the trolley to the ocean and walk along the 10 mile sea wall, or visit the historic **Bishop's Palace and the Moody Mansion**, or take the free ferry to **Bolivar Island** and watch the dolphins.

Must-See Museums:

Menil Collection (FREE) - Contains collections of Dominique De Menil showing medieval, folk art, and contemporary artifacts and art. **Rothko Chapel** (near Menil) is a non-denominational chapel containing dozens of Rothko paintings.

Fine Arts Museum (1001 Bissonnet St. 713-635-7300) holds over 40,000 pieces of art from antiquity to provocative modern and features touring exhibits.

Houston Center for Contemporary Craft (4848 Main St. 713-529-4848) features creations of internationally acclaimed as well as emerging artists and artisans.

Natural Science Museum (1 Hermann Circle Dr. 713-639-4600) contains magnificent mineral, natural history exhibits and a planetarium featuring laser shows and an **IMAX Theater**, a butterfly habitat, a paleontology exhibit of dinosaurs, and a new Chemistry Hall. (Call ahead for the IMAX reservations.) In November the special **Titanic Exhibit** will be shown at the Museum. See details page 11.

Buffalo Soldiers National Museum (713-942-8920) pays tribute to African-American military history from the Revolutionary War to modern times.

Heritage Society Homes and Museums in the Sam Houston Park downtown contains the oldest house in Houston and others restored.

American Cowboy Museum (11822 Alameda 713-433-4441) preserves the Western heritage of Blacks, Hispanics, Native Americans and Women. This ranch established in the mid 1800's gives walking and horseback tours. (Call ahead)

Talento Bilingue de Houston (near Guadalupe Plaza 713-222-1213) is one of the largest Latino cultural centers in the U.S. full of performing and visual arts and an award winning youth program.

Bayou Bend is the Estate of Ima Hogg now a museum with private, breath taking gardens.

Space Center Houston is the NASA Tourist Center (see scheduled tour on p. 77 for more details).

Battleship Texas – docked near San Jacinto Monument - Fought in both World Wars and restored.

Kathleen Regan Figley is a Master Certified Traumatologist and was recognized in 1998 as Green Cross Projects' Traumatologist of the Year. She is immediate Past President of Green Cross Projects, Inc. During the past 11 years

she has conducted training for many agencies. Ms. Figley has worked for more than 25 years in the field of human services in the areas of mental health, substance abuse, developmental disabilities, and disaster trauma. She is currently enrolled in the Master Trainer Program, and is eligible for the designation of Certified Emergency Manager.

The primary purpose of GCP, a non-profit corporation, is to provide traumatology specialists to communities that have been affected by disaster. In response to the 9-11 attack on the World Trade Center, Ms. Figley served as the Incident Commander for GCP. The GCP team consisted of 36 trauma professionals provided individual and group trauma intervention services to more than 2,700 people over a 4-week period. She also supervised the Compassion Fatigue Specialists who monitored the traumatologists to ensure the health and well-being of the response team.

Course Goal:

To provide the family therapist with the basics of traumatic stress -

both primary and secondary - including assessment and recovery.

Course Description/Objectives:

This course is designed to provide the practitioner with the basic tools necessary to respond to a traumatic incident. Instructional material will include appropriate response to terrorist incidents such as the September 11 attack on the World Trade Center. Participants in this course will learn to:

Dr. Boss and teams of Family Social Science faculty and graduate students traveled to New York City every other week throughout the fall term and worked with individuals, small groups, and large groups on issues of grief, ambiguous loss, and family stress resulting from the 9-11 catastrophe. They conducted family meetings in the labor union hall to link family and community in troubled times. New York City therapists were also trained to work with ambiguous loss issues regarding missing loved ones. Dr. Boss will discuss this in the workshop.

Pauline Boss is a professor, Family Social Science Dept., Univ. of Minnesota, a family therapist, and past president of NCFR. Her current research interest is on "successful caregivers" and since 9/11 - successful coping with a family member who is physically absent.



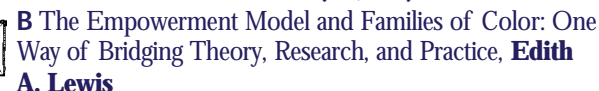

Professor Boss, a theoretical researcher and family therapist, will review the body of work with families distressed by situations of ambiguous loss and subsequent boundary ambiguity. Her scholarship encompasses both physical and psychological losses that remain unclear - e.g. when dementia takes the mind away or when the body is missing as in the collapse of the World Trade Center. Dr. Boss emphasizes what has been learned, what new questions have emerged, and what challenges remain. Her central theme will be the interdisciplinary link between science and practice for the development of useful preventive and clinical theory that can help diverse families understand and manage their everyday tensions and overcome their trauma in the event of catastrophe.

To review current demographic, sociological, and psychological evidence on the state of marriage. How has marriage changed in recent decades? Is marriage declining in importance? Is marriage still relevant in a "culture of divorce?" Or is marriage an adaptable and resilient institution? What form(s) will marriage take in the near future? To explore racial and ethnic variability in marriage. What are the particular strengths and potential challenges to marriage, among African-Americans, Latinos, and other minority communities? To consider the viability of alternatives to conventional marriage, especially nonmarital cohabitation. Is cohabitation a reasonable substitute for marriage? Does it meet

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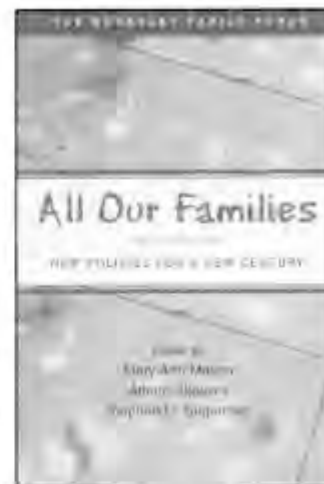

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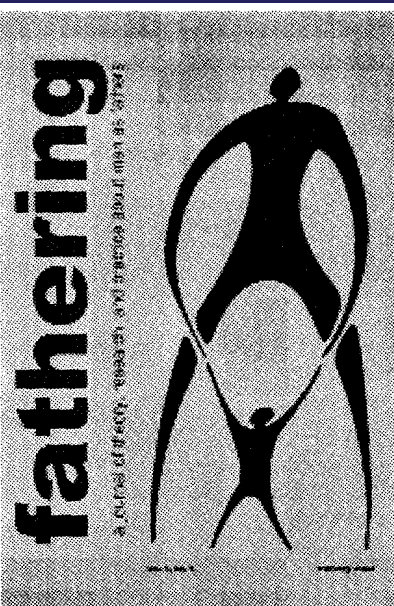
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Do You Ever Wonder About the Differences Between the Types of Sessions?

Here are some definitions:

Poster Session: A visual display with the purpose of presenting an important piece of work, on a large poster board. The author(s) are present during the entire poster session to answer questions. Attendees walk around the room and look at the displays and discuss the work with the author(s).

Paper Session: Three - four oral presentations organized around a theme by the section chair. Paper sessions have a discussant reviews papers individually as well as indicating how they add to our knowledge collectively.

Symposium: Collective presentations by a group of individuals who work in the same area. They bring different perspectives to an issue or practice. Panels comprised of several speakers, who after making brief introductory remarks, discuss the issue or topic. A discussant ties the papers together and suggests implications for practice. Time is allowed for questions from the audience.

Workshop: An in-depth presentation on a new method, source of data, practice for training and informing participants in a way that provides some hands on experience with the technique.

Round Table: A presenter leads a discussion in which all the audience actively participates. The leader provides an overview and materials that help define the issue and provide background information for participants.
