SEE THE BEST OF CONNECTICUT

Annual Meeting will be held at just the season to see Connecticut at its best. You will be rewarded by wandering off the main high-ways, through the smaller villages and countryside. Virtually all roads are hard surfaced and direction signs give help to the traveler looking for not only a variety in scenery, but an amazing number of activities, events, places of interest, historic sites, sports contests and educational institutions. Your convention packet will contain literature about "Things to See and Do in Connecticut". As you drive to Storrs on the New York Thruway, Route 95 will take you near Greenwich, Stamford, Norwalk, Bridgeport and Stratford. It would be more practical to change at Milford to the Merritt Parkway, unless you have time to wander on the shoreline and find Guilford, Niantic, New London and Mystic, in order to observe famous colonial atmosphere of the Old Forge, Harkness House and Mystic, Seaport.

If you come from the New England States or approach Connecticut from the Massachusetts Turnpike, scenery is perhaps the most promising attraction. However, don't forget Hartford is the capitol city with its famous Rose Garden and Mark Twain Memorial. If you are interested in history, the Webb House in Wethersfield, the Hillstead Museum in Farmington, and nearer to Storrs still, the Nathan Hale Homestead in Coventry. Connecticut has other educational institutions besides the University of Connecticut. You all know "Yale" in New Haven, Wesleyan in Middletown, Trinity College in Hartford, the United States Coast Guard Academy and Connecticut College in New London.

Many people enjoy public parks. Connecticut, a small state, is well endowed with such parks, seashore or inland. Gillette Castle is at a state park off Route 9 and is approached by the Chester Ferry. Harkness Park is in Niantic on Route 1, the shore road. Shore parts well known are Hammonasset Beach at Clinton, Rocky Neck at South Lyme, Ocean Beach at New London. The cities of Bridgeport, New Haven, Hartford, New Britain and Waterbury have city parks. It is too bad you will be too late for the laurel in Winsted.

There is always a good eating place nearby and outstanding motels for stops overnight. Every motorist has his own way of knowing of these highly advertised and recommended rest stops. For further guidance watch for Connecticut Development Commission maps posted at many filling stations along the way.
