The purpose was to discuss current emphases in the areas of premarital counseling, the pastor and the aging, understanding the adolescent, deviant behavior, and how the psychologists view behavior.

F. IVAN NYE and LOIS WLADIS HOFFMAN are editors of a new book, THE EMPLOYED MOTHER IN AMERICA, to be published by the College Department of Rand McNally this spring. The book brings together a comprehensive body of research findings on the massive movement of mothers into paid employment. Substituting actual research findings for speculative evaluations, it illuminates a situation that has recently emerged as a major phenomenon of American life.

RONALD L. NUTTALL, graduate student in Harvard University's Department of Social Relations is writing his Ph.D. dissertation on "The Psychological Correlates of Courtship Behavior."

OSCAR E. FEUCHT writes that the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod, St. Louis, Missouri, is making a thorough survey of marriage education and marriage counseling needs, and will present a long-range program plan to their 1956 convention. A new committee has been formed to seek information concerning marriage, family, and marriage and family counseling courses which are being offered at universities and colleges, both private and state operated, secular and church related.
