RECENT TRAVELS OF NCFR PRESIDENT, BLAINE R. PORTER

Blaine Porter attended the Groves Conference in Tennessee, presiding over the last luncheon session; the NCFR board meetings, and the AAMC meetings which preceded it . . . On April 24th he spoke to a group of students and community members at the Univ. of Nevada, and on April 24th to the Northern California Council on Family Relations . . . On May 1 he attended a conference at which the U. S. National Committee of IUFO met with the representative of IUFO to the United Nations, and in addition to other business items, heard reports from other UN representatives . . . On May 4-5 he attended the 3rd Annual Conference on the Family and Society at Merrill-Palmer . . . On May 6-7 he was the speaker at the Annual Meeting of the Parent-Education Associates Workshop at East Lansing under the direction of Esther Middlewood . . . On May 8 he spoke at the Annual Meeting of the Michigan Council on Family Relations in Flint.

ERNEST G. OSBORNE MEMORIAL AWARD

The NCFR Board of Directors has voted to establish an award in memory of Lank Osborne, three times president of the Council. The Award will be made for excellence in the teaching of family relations, since it was for this that he gave so unstintingly of both his personal and professional time, and since he was known so widely for his own excellence in this area. The Award will honor teaching which might occur at any academic level--elementary school, high school, college; parent education; extension; or community projects; and will be comparable to the Burgess Award for significant research in the family relations field.

Such an endeavor as is proposed will involve establishing a fund sufficient to yield an annual interest of \$300 to \$500, i.e., a minimum principal of \$10,000. It is hoped that many will wish to contribute to the fund in the same lavish way that Lank contributed of himself in the growth and development of people and of educators.

An Osborne Memorial Breakfast will be part of the Sunday program of the October NCFR meeting, at which time a report will be made regarding progress on the project. If you are attending the conference, plan to be present. Tickets will be \$5.00.

CHRISTINE BEASLEY, University of Tennessee, is serving as chairman of the Osborne Award Committee. PAUL VAHANIAN, Teachers College, will preside at the breakfast.

SOME ITEMS FROM THE NCFR BOARD MEETING, APRIL 12, 1964

A motion was passed that all past NCFR presidents be made Life Members of the organization.

The NCFR accepted an invitation from the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists to join with them in planning for the development of a national program in family life education. The committee will consist of two members each from NCFR, AAMC, and Groves; and three from the ACOG. FRANK LOCK, M.D., Chapel Hill, N. Carolina, a NCFR member, is president-elect of the ACOG. NCFR representatives will be President BLAINE PORTER and President-elect CLARK VINCENT.

The Mass Media Committee report from IVAN NYE, chairman, stated that they are undertaking to make accessible to mass circulation magazines selected annotated bibliographies and a list of qualified professionals on a number of subjects of interest to the public: teen age marriage, the employed mother, the changing American family, marriage interaction, single persons and marriagability. Committee members include LEE BURCHINAL, WILLIAM KENKEL, ELEANORE LUCKEY.

MARVIN SUSSMAN, Journal Editor, announced two new department editors: Articles in Brief, WILLIAM F. KENKEL; Teacher Exchange, ROSE SOMERVILLE. Letters to the Editor and Rejoiners have become a regular feature. Machinery is rolling toward production of a separate monograph series. The Nov. issue will feature articles devoted to the theme "Poverty," based on presentations at the recent Groves Conference. CATHERINE CHILMAN, program chairman for that meeting, will be co-editor.

MICHIGAN: Theme of Annual Meeting: Community/Family: Pressure/Support. BLAINE R. PORTER addressed the conference on "Values and Family Pressures." ARMIN GRAMS AND JOHN CHANTINY, Merrill Palmer, spoke on "A Look at Youth Today." Mel Ravitz discussed "Communities Build Support for Families under Pressure."

ELBA CRUM, Consultant, Family Life Education, Adult and Vocational Division, Seattle Public Schools, has been responsible for a variety of programs this year. An especially exciting pilot undertaking was the Madrona Preschool Enrichment Project, designed to strengthen the families of Seattle's central area and through several means to improve the situation of the families and their preschool children. Some adults in the area have little education. Their attitudes and past experiences provide little support for children's interest in learning, so that children may enter school handicapped and defeated from the start, lacking the normal preschool experiences to help them make a good beginning. FRANK P. FIDLER, Associate Secretary, Board of Christian Education, United Church of Canada, had as one of his major responsibilities this past year the re-organization of the Marriage Guidance Council of his church. He is on the Planning Committee for the Canadian Conference on the Family, a bi-lingual and multi-cultural assembly June 8-10, 1964 in Ottawa; and the North American Conference on Church and Family in June, 1966 in Southern Ontario. Theme of the latter will be "Theological Foundations for a Relevant Ministry to Families in Today's World."

HARRY HYDE, JR., Bryn Mawr, Pa., is teaching 2 courses in Sociology at Temple, where he received his Ed. M. in Educational Psychology and where he is enrolled in the Ph. D. program in Sociology.

CONSTANTINA SAFILIOS-ROTHSCHILD received her Ph.D. degree in Sociology in June 1963 from Ohio State Univ. and is on the faculty of Merrill Palmer. She is teaching a Seminar on Family and Society and this fall will teach a graduate course on "Family and Contemporary Societies." She is also engaged in cross-cultural research with lower class families in Detroit and Greece.

BERT GLASSBERG, M.D., Washington University, gave 2 addresses at Lindenwood College, St. Charles, Mo., recently, on "Being a Human Being" and "Fulfillment in Marriage." Dr. Glassberg is the regular marriage consultant on the weekly KMOX radio program, "Ask the Marriage Counselor," and has a book ready for publication this month. He will attend the International Congress on Social Psychiatry in London in August.

GEOFFREY ESTY, M. D., President of Tri-State Council, represented NCFR at a conference on "The Nuclear Scientific Era: The Child and His Education," in April. The conference was under the auspices of the Walden School and was attended by 538 delegates from 30 states. "Within the next decade, possibly sooner, the world already vastly changed, will undergo further marked transformation under the impact of a scientific revolution, constantly progressing, which thus far has received only fragmented acknowledgment in planning for the future of our society . . . Revolutionary scientific advances, a growing population, half of which within a year will be 25 years old or less, a school population in which not more than 40% go beyond high school, the increasing proportion of an enlarged unskilled labor force, the advances of automation, the immediate need to provide equal opportunity for all our citizens, make imperative discussion of new designs for a new world . . . The Conference has been called in an effort to meet this challenge. Our special focus is on imperative new designs for the education of children, the organization of curricula and the preparation of teachers." (Milton Schwebel, Professor of Education, New York Univ.). Dr. Esty is heartily commended for the splendid report he prepared after the conference.

MRS. ELIZABETH COLLINS, IUFO REPRESENTATIVE AT THE UNITED NATIONS, has again prepared material about UN Family Life Developments . . . A Committee on Housing, Building, and Planning was established in 1962 by Resolution 9030 of the Economic and Social Council and was approved by the General Assembly. Among the resolutions approved has been one calling for the establishment of an international center for documentation on housing, building, and physical planning, and another for the coordination and organization of existing, and increased, international assistance to housing, building, and planning. Mountainous housing shortages exist throughout much of the world but particularly in the developing countries; and cost of housing in these countries is high. There is a need for study on social aspects of housing, rural housing, and community facilities . . . The 18th Session of the General Assembly of the UN adopted the report of the UN Preparatory Committee and designated 1965 as International Cooperation year. Over 300 representatives of non-governmental organizations, both international and national, met in February to explore ways and means by which they could coordinate their efforts for the success of the ICY . . . The first meeting of the UNICEF 30 nation board ever to be held in a developing country met in Thailand in January. Population growth, special needs of Asian children, financial resources, and the future scope of its assistance were discussed . . . A very successful seminar of Non-governmental Organizations, under the sponsorship of the International Council of Women, was held in Bangkok prior to the UNICEF meeting. The Committee is composed of more than 70 international voluntary organizations having consultative status with UNICEF. Their objective is to coordinate efforts on behalf of UNICEF. Those interested in a more detailed report on the UNICEF Board meeting may see the February issue of UNICEF news and an article in the March UNITED NATIONS REVIEW. A family and health program supported by a grant from the National Institutes of Mental Health provides traineeships for eight students pursuing the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in sociology.
