These lectures, in clarifying the role of the family in human adaptation, raise many questions concerning current concepts of personality development and its aberrations and offer an approach to their resolution. The contributions of various social scientists, including Parsons, Whorf, Roger Brown, Brunner, and Meade, are utilized as well as concepts indigenous to psychiatry and psychoanalysis, directing attention to the convergence of the various social and biological sciences in the study of the family.

The first lecture, "The Family and Human Adaptation in the Scientific Era," examines the thesis that "the isolated nuclear family, despite its paucity of stabilizing forces, is better suited for preparing its children to live in a society that is rapidly changing its adaptive techniques than are families with extended kinship systems."

The second and third lectures deal with what the family must provide to assure adequate adaptive capacities and ego integration in its offspring. In "Family Organization and Personality Structure," Dr. Lidz proposes that "the essential dynamic structure of the family rests upon the parents' ability to form a coalition, maintain boundaries between generations, and adhere to their appropriate sex-linked role." He then goes on to examine how failure to meet these requisites leads to distortion in the ego structuring of their children.

In "The Family, Language, and Ego Functions," the author examines the family's capacity to transmit the basic adaptive techniques of the culture. He focuses specifically on transmission of linguistic meanings, which are considered essential for the communication and utilization of other instrumental techniques and critical to ego functioning. He examines theoretical and clinical evidence that limitations of the "mind" are often deficiencies in linguistic and experiential symbols required for thinking, and that distorted mentation can derive from family environment.

It is an easy book to read, written with the author's by now well-known and incomparable clarity of language. Yet this ease is deceptive. A really adequate description of the book would require almost as many words as are in the book. The economy of words and the felicity of expression may too readily obscure the fact that sometimes the author deals in a few sentences with entirely new phenoment and presents completely new perspectives on familiar events.
