#### CHICAGO IN OCTOBER

Sightseers will find many attractions right in the hotel's "front yard," including the Art Institute, the Field Museum of Natural History, the Adler Planetarium and the newly restored Auditorium Theater, an outstanding landmark. Marshall Fields, center of the State Street shopping district, is within walking distance. If you have the time, you should plan an extra day or two in Chicago, to include the Oriental Institute at the University of Chicago, the unique Museum of Science and Industry, etc. The local arrangements committee, with Charles Sutton as chairman, promises an extensive listing of what-is-to-do-and-to-see, and suggestions of the best ways to do both.

Food in Chicago is wildly exciting either in the modest neighborhood, ethnic restaurants or the expensive Northside cafes. The Pick-Congress itself offers many interesting possibilities for your dining pleasure, including the Royal Scots Grill, The Tipperary Inn and the Pompeian Room, in addition to the Coffee House, and two popular cocktail lounges.

Transportation is easiest by air to Chicago; Continental bus service directly to your hotel is about \$2.00 one way from the airport. Take taxi, bus, and subway in the city. Twenty four hour parking around the hotel will range from \$3.50 to \$5.00, and additional parking fees will be necessary every time you use the car in Chicago.

### NATIONAL RESEARCH AND THEORY CONCERNS COMMITTEE OF THE NCFR

The National Research and Theory Concerns Committee of NCFR is now doing several studies whose purpose is to bring to family researchers and students information of use to them. Three of the studies are in the following areas: programs for graduate study; post doctoral opportunities and the collation of ongoing research by family social scientists. This information will be distributed nationally. The first will be used by potential graduate students to help them decide about where to apply for graduate training in the area of family studies. The second will be used by those interested in taking a leave in order to upgrade their training, to establish exchange programs between universities, and by those investigating opportunities for sabbatic leaves. The collation of ongoing research will be useful to faculty and students who can become acquainted with a research project before its findings are published. Exchanges between family social scientists at early points may lead to more cross-university studies. Harold Feldman, Cornell University, is chairman of the committee.

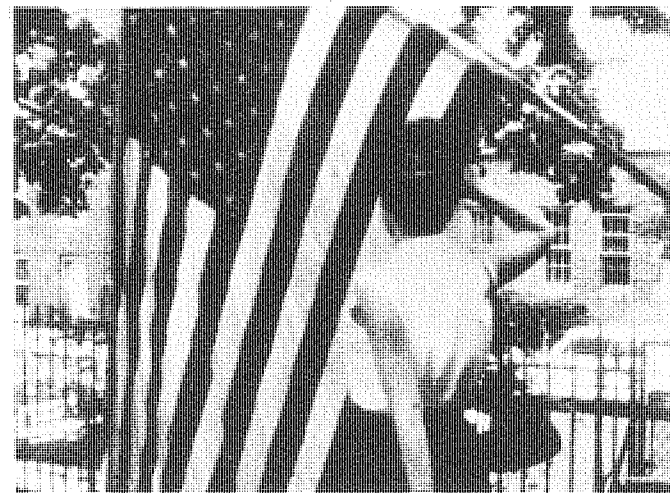
