In addition to outstanding plenary sessions, Murray Straus, Program Chairman, reports that each of the Section chairmen is putting together a very worthwhile program. As usual, there will be a mix of sessions devoted to the general theme of the meeting, "Politics, Power, and the Family." In addition, each Section will offer topics of particular concern to that group. For example, in the Research and Theory Section, Robert Bell has planned a session on "Women in Control," and another on "The Politics of

Abortion." In the Special Emphases Section, Richard Kerckhoff has a session on "The American Indian Family," and is arranging another on "The Power Politics of the Family of the Future." 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WORKSHOPS

RESEARCH METHODOLOGY WORKSHOPS: The NCFR Theory and Research Committee is sponsoring two workshops on research and methodology during the summer of 1972. These are designed primarily

for faculty (including young Ph.D.'s who are beginning research programs) rather than students. One workshop will be held at the University of New Hampshire from July 10-14 under the direction of Murray A. Straus. This workshop is particularly interested in laboratory experimental studies, but is not restricted to such studies. The other one is under the direction of Boyd C. Rollins and it will be at Brigham Young University from July 31-August 4. Reuben Hill and Wesley R. Burr will be consultants in the B.Y.U. workshop.

The objective of the workshops is the development of a fundable research proposal by each participant. The participants can be involved for either the first three days (critique of preliminary proposal only) or for all five days (critique of both a preliminary and revised proposal). The universities will provide working areas, library facilities, conference rooms, xerox services, and some secretarial help. The deadline for admission is June 15.
