General Program Chairman and NCFR President-elect, Leland Axelson, Florida State University, announces that the theme is FAMILY STYLE AND PERSONAL FREEDOM. Persons interested in presenting papers are urged to contact the appropriate section chairmen promptly regarding ideas and time table. Student involvement is sought.

RESEARCH AND THEORY SECTION. Joan Aldous, Family Study Center, University of Minnesota, 1014 Social Science Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55455, Chairman. Sessions will focus on the theory development process. The following topics will be considered: 1) analysis and clarification of concepts important in the family area; 2) integration of existing research on some topic (codification); 3) reports of research findings with a focus on hypothesis testing; 4) theoretical papers e.g. new theories in a content area; revision and clarification of existing theories or theory development; 5) applied research or theory.

FAMILY ACTION SECTION. Mary Heltsley, Department of Family Environment, Iowa State University, Ames, Iowa 50010, Chairman. Sessions will center around the conference theme, FAMILY STYLE AND PERSONAL FREEDOM, focussing on: 1) research related to current individual and family needs, changes, problems or life styles; 2) action programs related to current family concerns; 3) position papers about controversial family issues; 4) legislative leaders interested in family policy-making.

STUDENT PARTICIPATION IN NCFR

Two hundred three students registered for the 1972 Annual Meeting held in Portland. That represents approximately 23% of the total 888 registrants. Not bad!

Even more encouraging is the fact that one out of eight presentations at the Annual Meeting was made by a student. Several states had as high as five students making presentations. Less encouraging is the news that twenty nine states had no registered students in attendance at the conference. Nevertheless, we are looking ahead to Toronto in anticipation of even greater student involvement.

We are seeking inexpensive accommodations for students in Toronto and we hope that you will be making arrangements for your presentations at the Annual Meeting (see the call for papers). If paper presentations are not your thing, look toward the education section--action, participation and creativity are welcomed. Chairing a session is not out of the question either. You do not have to be a national authority or even a graduate student to have something to say that is of value and interest; that is, undergrads are appreciated and welcome. All that is needed immediately are your ideas. Commit yourselves early.

By the way, do not forget the student award! Let your profs know you are interested. Dig out your best work and make it better. Judges are being selected. Look for more information.

If you don't have a paper to present, don't feel like chairing a section and don't feel as if you might win the student award--don't despair. Come to Toronto and meet the people who wrote your text books; they would love it.

For those of you on the local scenes who would like more information and involvement, contact your local NCFR affiliated councils and your student representatives. If there aren't any students reps perhaps you can justify the need and demonstrate the opportunity that evolves from having student representation. We shall be contacting the affiliated councils from this end--you put it together at yours.

Start looking for money to get to Toronto. Check with the student finance office;

some universities and colleges have money for student participation in national conferences. Do not forget your departments! Sure they will tell you that money is tight, but the only way you will get it is to ask for it. See you in Toronto.

FRANCIS, BARBARA

I'm a graduate student in HDFS at Cornell, writing my dissertation on families of New Zealand working mothers. Other research: "Behavior Modification of Husbands by Wives," "Working Welfare Mothers." Have survived teaching large survey on "Changing American Family"; am offering "Achievement and Women" in Women's Studies (of which I was a founding mother.) Plan to continue in academia. NCFR member since 1968. On Relevant Issues: I'd solicit your views - Here are mine:

Greater Student Involvement - Students constitute 20% of NCFR's membership but are under-represented in the publications, committees, and conventions. More resources should be made available for participation.

Family as Field of Study - What could and should be a creative and "relevant" area of study too often fails to attract serious students. Stale programs need re-evaluation and updating by those of us with futures at stake.

NCFR as Mediator of Social Change - A 1971 survey of NCFR members reports that the majority regards the issues of homosexuality and women's rights as "outside of the social mainstream" and inappropriate for NCFR concern. I disagree. (The Family Coordinator, vol. 21, p. 343)

International and Interdisciplinary Challenge - I support Dr. Leslie's presidential recommendations for a broader membership base. NCFR needs the vitality of good debate beyond that of researchers vs practitioners.

JONES, JOYCE KEMP

I am a graduate student at Washington State University pursuing a Ph.D. in Sociology, specializing in family sociology and deviance. I received by B.A. from Grambling College and my M.A. from Washington State University. From 1970 to 1972, I was a teaching assistant in the family area. At present, I hold a National Institute of Mental Health Family Traineeship.

My M.A. thesis is "The Effect of Conjugal Power on Self-Spouse Perceptions" wherein I attempted to find the effect power had on the perceptions of spouses within each family power structure. A paper was extracted which will be read at the Southwestern Sociological Meeting in Dallas in March. I may expand this research for my dissertation with major emphasis on power, role-sharing, and self-spouse perceptions.

Sometime after graduation I would like to use the same research design within the Black Family. I feel that much can be learned from the research if more Black sociologists get involved in studying the family structure of Black Americans.

If I am elected, I shall work toward getting more student involvement and participation at NCFR Meetings, in the NCFR organization itself, and in publishing articles. I feel that not only students presenting papers, but all students attending should be made to feel that they are a part of the functioning of the organization and work accordingly. I am also going to work toward more

minority involvement (Blacks, Chicanos, Native Americans and women) in the family action group as well as in research. I feel that it is about time that these groups be allowed to speak for "themselves" and not be "spoken of" by majority group sociologists who are only interested in such persons from a research point of view.
