THEME: FAMILY STYLE AND PERSONAL FREEDOM

PLENARY SESSIONS.

Robert T. Francoeur, professor of social biology and experimental embryology at Fairleigh Dickinson University, will speak Wednesday evening. Dr. Francoeur is the author of: Eve's New Rib: Twenty Faces of Sex; Marriage and Family; Utopian Motherhood: New Trends in Man; and Hot Sex, Cool Sex: Fidelity in Marriage. He was recently appointed Consultant to the Judicial Council of the AMA Advisory Committee.

Robert F. Bundy, writing in Theological Studies, said of him, "Francoeur is a rare combination of scientific competence, capacity for integration of complete ideas, lively imagination, warm humor, deep humanism. His probing, incisive questions overwhelm and bludgeon the mind. Many will be deeply upset. He has few answers because his questions deal with issues without precedent in history or morality. But we must face them individually and collectively, or accept a mindless wandering into the future--or worse, the utter dehumanization of man."

One of Dr. Francoeur's avowed goals is to help man survive the culture shock of man-made man, embryo transplants, frozen sperm and eggs, artificial wombs, and xeroxed people.

Murray Straus, Professor of Sociology, University of New Hampshire, and NCFR president, will give the address at the banquet Friday evening.

A third plenary speaker, from the Canadian government, will be announced in the August Newsletter.

Dr. Minor has been Family Relations Consultant and in charge of sex education leader development for the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. for several years.
