## FAMILY STYLE AND PERSONAL FREEDOM

### THE 1973 NCFR ANNUAL MEETING ADVANCE PROGRAM

OCTOBER 16-20, 1973

TORONTO, CANADA is the conference city, described by *Frank Fidler*, a Toronto NCFR member working diligently to make this conference as outstanding as its predecessors.

Over three hundred years ago, the Huron Indians called a sloping land where winding creeks joined a giant lake "The Meeting Place" - "TORONTO". Little did they know that Toronto would live up to that name as a true meeting place.

They did not realize that in 1973 the National Council on Family Relations would hold its annual conference in Toronto. Probably the first French Fur Trappers who established a small trading post by Lake Ontario were not aware that Toronto would become the centre of Commerce and Industry in a country known as "Canada".

This area, still known as Toronto, was eventually won in battle by the English. In 1867, the year the British North America Act established a Dominion of Canada, the Fathers of Confederation never dreamed that the NCFR would choose the Capital City of the Province of Ontario as a meeting site.

What will you, a delegate to the NCFR Annual Meeting, see of Toronto?

Your first view will be of the skyline, a magnificent blend of old and new architecture pointing skyward and rising solidly out of the heart of the city.

You will see acres of parkland, sprawling residential areas of tree-lined streets shading Victorian English Tudor Homes where the city's 2½ million residents live and recreate.

You will see the shoreline of Lake Ontario where the ships of the world make Toronto a regular port of call.

Toronto has another name--"The Cosmopolitan City"--dynamic in its cosmopolitan way of life, in its warmth and gaiety, its culture and achievements.

Toronto is a dynamic city that permeates the realm of private, public, professional, industrial, business and human activities. It is a city on the move!

The downtown shopping district is right around the corner from the Four Seasons Sheraton Hotel where the Conference will take place. Very close by, you can find Eaton's and Simpson's - Toronto's answer to Macy's and Gimbles in terms of major department stores.

A very short and safe subway ride will bring you to the "Village Area" of Toronto, which consists of a great many old converted homes that have become restaurants, boutiques and specialty shops. Remember the names of these streets: *Bloor Street between Avenue Road and Bay; Cumberland Avenue; Yorkville Avenue, Avenue Road between Bloor and Dupont*. This is an area which contains a myriad of shopping and other interesting activities.

From the Conference hotel, Four Seasons Sheraton, you will probably be able to look out your window at the new City Hall which dominates Nathan Phillips Square. Conceived by the late Viljo Revell of Finland, in an International Architectural Competition, its design was inspired by the lonely oyster that opens its curving shell to reveal a priceless pearl. The two concrete towers of the City Hall curve inward to face each

other and to look down upon their "Pearl" - a low circular building that houses the Council Chambers. This daring and unusual architectural masterpiece was opened amid a storm of public controversy that was subdued by a dramatic and dynamic tidal wave of civic pride.

At Nathan Phillips Square in front of the City Hall is the much publicized sculpture by Henry Moore, the "Archer". It was purchased by public subscription of funds and placed on the Square for all to see and enjoy, but as the publicity has pointed out, not necessarily to understand.

Toronto's Bay Street, the Financial Post of the whole country, is one block away from the hotel. The Toronto Stock Exchange, surpassed in size in North America only by New York, buzzes with the excitement and tension of securities trading. Activity on the trading floor increases to fever pitch, especially when a mine makes a new discovery. Even the spectators' and the visitors' gallery are apt to get caught up in the contagious and mysterious lure of the Stock Market.

There are a great many attractions in Toronto which are uniquely Canadian, such as Old Fort York, the McMichael Canadian Collection of art, the Royal Ontario Museum, the Ontario Science Centre and Ontario Place. The Art Gallery of Ontario, once a bastion of artistic conservatism, now "swings" with every contemporary art form that comes along.

Legitimate theatre abounds with the O'Keefe Centre, St. Lawrence Centre for the performing Arts, the Royal Alexandra, Theatre in the Dell, the Bayview Theatre and the Toronto Workshop Productions providing fine entertainment for theatre-goers.

"Cuisine" is a word that translates into "International" in Toronto. A variety of cuisines can be experienced which include French, German, Austrian, Hungarian, Italian, and seafood. Many experienced travellers are beginning to classify the gastronomic experience of Toronto as the finest in North America.

The public rapid transit system is new enough to be antiseptically clean by comparison with most other underground transportation networks and it is dependable and safe.

Certainly there can be no better "meeting place" than Toronto for the NCFR!

THE BEAUTIFUL AND IMAGINATIVELY BUILT NEW FOUR SEASONS-SHERATON is the Annual Meeting hotel. In addition to first rate conference facilities, a swimming pool, running track, Health Club, Squash Court, and sauna are provided for delegates who have time around the edges. Guaranteed rates are comparable to those in the U.S. for first class hotels: \$21-\$27 for single, \$27-\$35 for double, and \$11 for triple rooms. Triples are available only for students.

Students may choose to stay at the King Edward Sheraton, about four blocks away, where special student rates have also been obtained. Quads are \$20 a day and triples are \$18. At both hotels students must arrange ahead of time for their own roommates, or notify the NCFR office that they are looking for someone to share. The hotels cannot provide this service.

When you return the enclosed registration form to the NCFR office, you will be mailed a hotel registration card, to be returned directly to the hotel. As you save your pennies (dollars?) for the conference, remember that Canada has a 7% sales tax. The local arrangements people remind us too that with the exchange rates going up and down daily there are sometimes days when American money is at a slight discount.

THE PROGRAM offers important opportunities which far out-weigh mundane money matters. Lee Axelsson, general program chairperson, and Ben Ard, Ned Gaylin, Mary Heltsley, Joan Aldous, and Kay King, section chairpersons, have enthusiastically put together a professional conference no NCFR member will want to miss. A rather complete program outline follows, so that in addition to the program itself, members of various committees may note their special meetings. This year the Annual Meeting opens at noon Wednesday, with Round Tables and an afternoon Plenary Session. A special registration form is enclosed for these luncheon sessions.
