## NCFR-AAMFC ANNUAL MEETING

OCTOBER 22-26, 1974

JEFFERSON HOTEL

ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI

The National Council on Family Relations and the American Association of Marriage and Family Counselors will hold a combined Annual Meeting in 1974, and the program, based on the theme, "The Art and Science of Intimacy and Loving," promises to be a highly significant one. *Gerhard Neubeck, University of Minnesota*, general program chairperson, reports that *Sidney Jourard, Author and Professor of Psychology, University of Florida*, *Marya Mannes, Columnist and Author*, *Laura Singer-Magdoff, Marriage Counselor and Author*, and *Sam Magdoff, Dean of the Phoenix School of Design, New York*, have accepted invitations to give plenary presentations. In addition, *Leland Axelsson, Florida State University*, NCFR president, and *Clark Vincent, Bowman Gray School of Medicine, AAMFC president*, will speak at the annual banquet. The chairpersons of the five NCFR Sections are now calling for program participants.

**COUNSELING.** This year for the first time the American Association of Marriage and Family Counselors will join the NCFR Counseling Section in providing a conjoint conference and annual meeting. This means that the Counseling Section and AAMFC will have a single committee planning the many sessions which will be provided.

The theme for the joint counseling meetings is Intimacy in the Family Life Cycle. All who would like to be involved in the presentation of a program are encouraged to keep this in mind and to focus attention on this topic. Obviously, the topic, Intimacy provides a fairly wide latitude while dealing with a single subject in depth.

In order to provide for variety in the manner of presentation, five areas are proposed. Six different programs will be divided equally among them: a) Prepared papers on special topics, or research projects - 15 minutes limit, three papers each session with ample time for discussion; b) Experiential action programs, half time for lecture, theory or activity session, including active participation, and half time for discussion and group evaluation; c) Panel discussion with two to four individuals presenting separate and complimentary new points about a topic or idea; d) Individual or cooperative presentation about a therapeutic technique of general interest, e.g., behavior modification, psychoanalytic, Gestalt, Rational Emotive, T-A, Family Therapy, etc.; e) "How to" session on the conduct of a private practice in marriage and family counseling, problems related to insurance

and other financial matters, group practice, etc. as well as topics related to training and supervision.

In order to provide for most intimate and meaningful interaction, each program time allotment will have several simultaneous meetings. Each one attending will have to make a choice from among several programs. This means that more people can participate in program presentation and the audience will have greater opportunity to interact with the presenters.

This program promises to be the largest Counseling Session ever held, by far. Let's make it the best as well. Send your ideas, recommendations, etc. to *Ed Rydman, 12651 Croydon Circle, Dallas, Texas 75230*, Counseling Section Chairperson, by April 15.

**EDUCATION.** Emphasis in the Education Section will be on critical issues facing the family life educator. Some of the presentations will be by invitation. In addition, in keeping with the theme, there will be papers or experiential descriptions of how family life education can be taught through art, music, and literature. As much interaction and involvement as possible will be encouraged. *Sander Latts, Family Studies-Child Development Department, 30 Nicholson Hall, University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55455*, is Section Chairperson.

**FAMILY ACTION.** This Section will be interested in papers which deal with Drugs and the Family, the Aged, Day Care, Divorce, Alternative Life Styles, Laws which relate to the Family, including such areas as sex and art, intimacy, pornography, sex, etc.; Welfare Policy, Poverty and Family Assistance, Mental Health, and Population and Family Planning. Papers on applied programs and policies relating to the family are sought. Persons who might have new ideas for presenting particular topics, other than the traditional presentation of papers, i.e. group discussion, etc., are encouraged to submit these plans. Send 200-300 word abstracts by April 15 to *Sharon Price-Bonham, Chairperson, Department of Child and Family Development, University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia 30601*. She would also appreciate hearing from people interested in chairing sessions.

**RESEARCH AND THEORY.** Since this is a joint meeting of NCFR and AAMFC, special attention will be given to research and theory related to applied problems, including marital and family

intervention. Theoretical papers and research projects illustrating how to bridge the gap between the researcher, theorist and practitioner will be emphasized, although other papers will be seriously considered. Students and practitioners are encouraged to submit papers or write if they are interested in serving as chairpersons or discussants. Abstracts (500 words or more) and preliminary papers should be sent by April 15 to: David H. Olson, Research and Theory Section Chairperson, Family Social Science, 217 North Hall, University of Minnesota, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101.

In addition to regular meetings, the Section is sponsoring a Pre-Conference Workshop on Theory Development. This Workshop will focus on theory papers that are in the process of development (working papers) rather than completed papers. These papers will be duplicated and circulated to all participants before the workshop. Each session will discuss one paper for 1-1/2 hours. Abstracts of theoretical working papers for this Workshop should be sent to: Darwin Thomas, Family Research Center, Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah 84602.

SPECIAL EMPHASES. This Section will focus on positive values in family life through ethnic and cultural diversity. Robert Staples, Graduate Program in Sociology, University of California, 1373 Third Avenue, San Francisco, California 94143 is Section Chairperson.

ROUND TABLES. Round Table Coffees are planned for Wednesday afternoon, and Round Table Luncheons will be held Friday noon. These sessions will provide an opportunity for persons interested in a particular subject to discuss their ideas with a leader. In keeping with the theme of the 1974 NCFR-AAMFC Annual Meeting, The Art and Science of Intimacy and Loving, workshop participants will focus on the many kinds of loving in many kinds of lifestyles which find illumination in stories, poems, novels, plays, and biographies as well as in paintings and sculptures. The workshop will be of interest to educators, researchers, librarians. Enrollment will be limited to thirty. The fee will be \$25 and an additional \$5 for materials. The workshop will start at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 26 and will end by lunch time on Sunday, October 27. Enrollees will be taken in order of application. Fees are not returnable. 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#### IN MEMORIAM

Nadina Kavinsky, NCFR President in 1950-1951, died in California, November 24, at the age of 85. Dr. Kavinsky was a physician, a pioneer in planned parenthood, a marriage counselor, lecturer, and author. For eighteen years of her career she practiced in Orange County, where she organized the Orange County chapter of the NCFR. Her daughters characterize their mother as an enlightened woman decades before the phenomenon of women's liberation. Her son considered her adventurous, full of surprises, challenged by anything new. Memorials may be sent to the Child Guidance Center of Orange County, Planned Parenthood, or The City of Hope.

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Mary Landis died in California, November 9, 1973. She and her husband, Judson, produced numerous texts in the family sociology field. She was a member of the NCFR, the American Sociological Association, the Pacific Sociological Society, and the Population Council of America. In addition to Dr. Landis, she is survived by a daughter and a son. Memorial gifts may be sent to the American Cancer Society or to the Building Fund of the First Presbyterian Church, Berkeley, California.

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Doris Lauten, board member of the Greater Greensboro, North Carolina, Family Life Council, died in the fall. The Board of Directors has established a book memorial in Dr. Lauten's memory.

**NEBRASKA:** The Nebraska Council and the Department of Human Development and the Family, University of Nebraska-Lincoln will sponsor a conference March 23 at the Nebraska Center in Lincoln. Theme will be "Strengthening Family Life." *Ron Daly*, Extension Family Life Specialist, University of Nebraska-Lincoln, will give the keynote address. NORTH CAROLINA: Save September 27-28 for the 1974 Annual Conference, which will be held at the Appalachian State University Continuing Education Center, with Lester D. GREATER GREENSBORO, NORTH CAROLINA: The second annual workshop for clergy and selected laymen was held in January, to provide leaders with ideas and aids useful in developing their educational programs. This year's program focused on parent-child relationships, with Herbert Zerkof, Director of the Marriage and Family Counseling Institute, Charlotte, as keynote speaker.

Fourteen persons have been trained as co-leader for parent discussion groups, using as their text book, *Children: The Challenge* by Rudolf Dreikurs, M.D. Groups are currently being organized. In addition, several couples have been trained as leaders of Couples Communication Programs, using the Minnesota Couples Communication Program.

The mass media is being utilized for a series of several programs on the topic of runaways.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN COUNCIL ON FAMILY RELATIONS: This year the Council has held a number of educational programs. On November 9, 1973, Byron Norton, University of Northern Colorado, presented his views on "The Changing Role of the Elementary School Counselor and Its Effect on the Family." On March 1, 1974, Tim Theis, Co-Director of Synergy-7, Greeley, Colorado, spoke on "Premarital Education and Communication" at Colorado State University. Also, RMCFR was one of the sponsoring organizations for CSU's College of Home Economics Annual Consumer Concerns Conference. This year's theme focused on Child and Family Services.

Its theme focuses on "Strengthening the Family in the 70's: Parent-Child Relationships." D. Bruce Gardner, Chairman, Department of Child Development and Family Relationships, Colorado State University, will speak on "Effective Parenting in the 1970's." There will also be a symposium on child development, and seminars on the following topics: Developing a Positive Self-Concept in Preschoolers, Joys and Frustrations of Childrearing; Alternate Family Life Styles; Family Communications; Adolescent Parenting: Help for the Young; and Drug Use and the Family. W. Arthur Shirey is chairperson of the Conference Planning Committee, and the Department of Sociology and Anthropology, Metropolitan State College is host for the conference. RMCFR president is Gladys K. Phelan, E101 Rockwell Hall, Colorado State University, Ft. Collins, Colorado 80521.

TEXAS: Theme for the Annual Meeting March 28-29 at the Sheraton-San Antonio Motor Inn, San Antonio, is "The Family Moves Into the 21st Century." Stanley Fowler, Texas Tech, will give the keynote address on the theme. W. Clark Ellzey, Texas Tech, TCFR president, will be the luncheon speaker, discussing humorous incidents in professional practices in the family life field. In addition, there will be a half dozen group discussions.

TRI-STATE: "Education for Parenthood" is the theme for a March 23 Conference sponsored by the Tri-State Council, the Southeastern District of the New York State Home Economics Association, and the Department of Family and Consumer Studies, Herbert H. Lehman College, at the College. At the morning session, Georgia McMurray, Commissioner, Agency for Child Development, New York City, will speak on "All of Our Children," and W. Stanley Kruger, U. S. Department of HEW, will discuss "Current Issues in Education for Parenthood." This will be followed by a panel discussion of "How Do You Answer All Those People Who Say 'Parenting is Doing What Comes Naturally?'" MINNESOTA COUPLES COMMUNICATION PROGRAM:

The Minnesota Couples Communication Program is a structured, experiential developmental program. Its overall goal is to equip couples--married, living together, considering marriage (teenagers to adults)--with communication principles and skills which will enable them to deal with different types of issues as they build their relationship over time. To accomplish this, couples learn frameworks for increasing awareness of how they communicate and specific behavioral skills for choosing alternative ways of communicating. In group, they practice new patterns of effective communications. The Couples Handbook and suggested exercises assist in the transfer of learning from the group context to other situations.

MCCP trains and certifies instructors to conduct couples groups. Instructor training is done in pairs (married or professional teams). After training and certification, certified instructors may conduct couples groups by themselves without a co-instructor.

**THE NATIONAL GENETICS FOUNDATION, A RESOURCE FOR FAMILIES WITH GENETIC DISEASE:** Recognizing that hereditary disease can place serious strains on a family, the professional in the area of marriage and family relations will be interested in the National Genetics Foundation, a voluntary health agency which assists patients and families burdened with a genetic disorder.

The Foundation coordinates a Network of Genetic Counseling and Treatment Centers located at 46 medical teaching institutions throughout the United States and Canada which provide diagnosis, treatment, and counseling for genetic disease.

Genetic counseling, which has been defined as the total process of communication relative to the occurrence, or risk of occurrence, of a genetic disorder in a family, is recommended for couples who have had a child or children with a birth malformation or genetic disease and are concerned for future offspring; and for families (or a couple getting married) where there is a history of genetic disease, such as muscular dystrophy, cystic fibrosis, mongolism, Huntington's chorea, or where there is a crippling or handicapping disorder such as blindness or deafness that affects one or more family members.

Recent advances in diagnosis and treatment, and such new techniques as amniocentesis--the withdrawal of a small amount of the fluid surrounding the fetus to permit prenatal diagnosis of certain genetic disorders--have provided new hope and increased the options available for a family with a genetic problem. In any case, counseling permits families to make plans and base important decisions on accurate medical information.

Referrals to the Network of Genetic Counseling and Treatment Centers are arranged through the New York office of the National Genetics Foundation which serves as a clearing house, channeling all requests to the appropriate center. Charges, if any, depend on the center, and no one is turned away for inability to pay. Requests for referral may come directly from the

patient or family; from the physician; or from the social worker or professional in agencies concerned with adoption, family relations, family planning, etc. The address of the National Genetics Foundation is 250 West 57th Street, New York, New York 10019. Phone (212) 265-3166.

From: Student Representatives to the Board and Executive Committee of the NCFR

An appeal to the NCFR Affiliated Council representatives for more direct and grassroots involvement in the affiliated councils was made at the 1973 Annual Meeting of the NCFR in Toronto. This appeal was followed up with a presentation to the Executive Committee of NCFR at their January 1974 meeting in New Orleans. Following are some of the considerations presented:

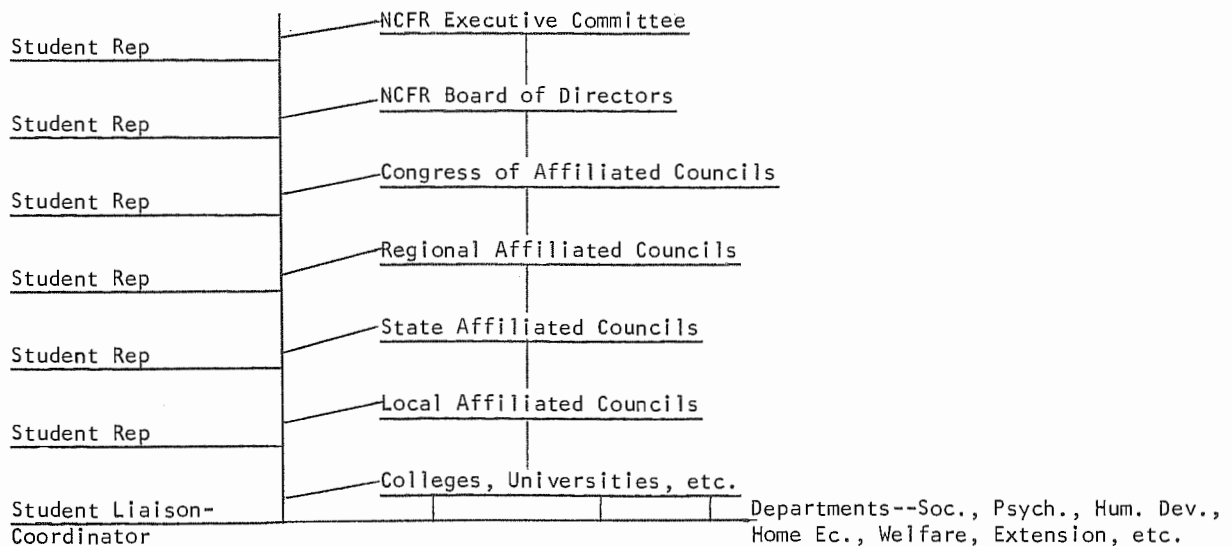
In order to reach and serve students effectively we must have student activists at the grass-roots levels.

Example 1: Local, State, and Regional Affiliated Council Student Representatives.  
Duties: Serve on boards of affiliated councils to represent student interests. Work toward securing student memberships, interest and subsequent participation on local and state as well as regional and national levels. Increase interest in maintaining student input on committees, task forces, program presentations, and other activities of NCFR and affiliated councils. Facilitate student travel to annual meetings at all levels, and student housing.

Example 2: Establish Student Liaison-Coordiators at universities and colleges. A more direct liaison with NCFR and with affiliated councils representatives could be effected as well as providing an immediate contact person to act as a catalyst-initiator for student participation. Establish a network of student activists who are able and willing to work for student interests and participation at the local levels. Duties: Serve as a catalyst-initiator model for local students; engender student interest, membership, and participation; assist in arranging travel to affiliate and national meetings (example: garnering university cars, funds, etc.); publicize annual NCFR Student Award (\$500.00) and enlist support, applications, etc.; assist in gaining pertinent information regarding academic programs in the family area--for publication in the student publication, Student Perspectives.

Example 3: It is also believed that student representation should exist at the level of the Congress of Affiliated Councils. Responsibilities would include all those mentioned heretofore as well as the coordination of student activities.

In summary, student representation has been requested within the affiliated council structure including student representation on the Congress, Regional, State, and Local boards as well as establishing a network of "field reps" or student liaison-coordinators at the university and college campuses.



When the proposal was made, discussion ensued regarding implementation. It was intended that student representatives be selected in a manner similar to that to be devised by the Affiliated Councils for other member representation at the local, regional, and congress level. The establishment of the "field representatives" (Local Student Liaison-Coordinators) network will probably require direct solicitation by affiliated council members and students. I do not propose that this will be an easy task, but I do maintain that it should prove fruitful and enhancing.

The proposal was presented to the Congress of Affiliated Councils and the Executive Committee of the National Council on Family Relations to gain their support and approval for implementation. The proposal was met with positive regard and a temporary appointment of a student representative to the Congress of Affiliated Councils was made by Ronald Pitzer, Chairperson of the NCFR Affiliated Councils. Some Regional, State, and Local Councils have appointed student representatives to their governing and policy-setting bodies but not nearly all of them. Our goal is to gain 100% representation on all council boards. If we are to begin implementation of this proposal, we shall first have to gain the support of the student membership. For these representatives to be effective and facilitate meeting the needs of students we must hear from the students. We need active coordinators in the departments on the campuses where the students are located--catalyst-initiators, if you will--who are willing and able to work for themselves and other students; people who are where the students are--at the grass-roots--who will act as liaison for the student representatives and students. These student liaison coordinators will be the ones you know and have selected to represent you, and who can give and carry forward your needs and wants.

We are counting on you to organize yourselves in grass-roots student interest bodies, select representatives to carry your interests and wants to the local, state and regional affiliated councils, and begin to establish student representation on these bodies. We shall instigate efforts from the top down. A suggested approach follows:

1. Organize a local student interest group to select a Student Liaison-Coordinator for yourselves.
2. Initiate a proposal for student representation on the local, state, and regional NCFR Affiliated Councils (lists of these councils and the appropriate person to contact can be secured by writing to the NCFR Office or to Ronald Pitzer, NCFR Affiliated Councils Chairperson, 74 Applied Social Sciences Building, University of Minnesota, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101). Submit a list of names of student nominees whom you believe could and would serve student interests on these governing boards. The affiliated council chairpersons should be willing to help you prepare such a proposal--don't hesitate to ask.
3. Follow-up on your proposal--don't let it die of neglect.
4. Let your student representatives to the National Council on Family Relations Board of Directors know who you are, what you are doing and where you are located so we can assist you in your endeavors. Write us for any further information you might require.

Good luck, and push on!!! Please remember, NCFR has traditionally accepted and facilitated student involvement. We want your continued participation.

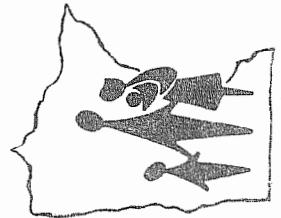

### FRANCIS, BARBARA

I'm a graduate student in HDFS at Cornell, writing my dissertation on families of New Zealand working mothers. Other research: "Behavior Modification of Husbands by Wives," "Working Welfare Mothers." Have survived teaching large survey on "Changing American Family"; am offering "Achievement and Women" in Women's Studies (of which I was a founding mother.) Plan to continue in academia. NCFR member since 1968. On Relevant Issues: I'd solicit your views - Here are mine:

Greater Student Involvement - Students constitute 20% of NCFR's membership but are under-represented in the publications, committees, and conventions. More resources should be made available for participation.

Family as Field of Study - What could and should be a creative and "relevant" area of study too often fails to attract serious students. Stale programs need re-evaluation and updating by those of us with futures at stake.

NCFR as Mediator of Social Change - A 1971 survey of NCFR members reports that the majority regards the issues of homosexuality and women's rights as "outside of the social mainstream" and inappropriate for NCFR concern. I disagree. (The Family Coordinator, vol. 21, p. 343)

International and Interdisciplinary Challenge - I support Dr. Leslie's presidential recommendations for a broader membership base. NCFR needs the vitality of good debate beyond that of researchers vs practitioners.

### JONES, JOYCE KEMP

I am a graduate student at Washington State University pursuing a Ph.D. in Sociology, specializing in family sociology and deviance. I received my B.A. from Grambling College and my M.A. from Washington State University. From 1970 to 1972, I was a teaching assistant in the family area. At present, I hold a National Institute of Mental Health Family Traineeship.

My M.A. thesis is "The Effect of Conjugal Power on Self-Spouse Perceptions" wherein I attempted to find the effect power had on the perceptions of spouses within each family power structure. A paper was extracted which will be read at the Southwestern Sociological Meeting in Dallas in March. I may expand this research for my dissertation with major emphasis on power, role-sharing, and self-spouse perceptions.

Sometime after graduation I would like to use the same research design within the Black Family. I feel that much can be learned from the research if more Black sociologists get involved in studying the family structure of Black Americans.

If I am elected, I shall work toward getting more student involvement and participation at NCFR Meetings, in the NCFR organization itself, and in publishing articles. I feel that not only students presenting papers, but all students attending should be made to feel that they are a part of the functioning of the organization and work accordingly. I am also going to work toward more

minority involvement (Blacks, Chicanos, Native Americans and women) in the family action group as well as in research. I feel that it is about time that these groups be allowed to speak for "themselves" and not be "spoken of" by majority group sociologists who are only interested in such persons from a research point of view.
