The book exhibit is as outstanding as ever. Awards will be presented--the Burgess, Osborne, and Student Awards plus the newest one, the NCFR Service Award.

TASK FORCES ARE OFFERING PROGRAMS. Registration information about the Divorce and Divorce Reform Workshop accompanies this mailing. The new Task Force on Aging is offering a special

session on "Be Intimate As Long As You Live." The Task Force on Women's Rights and Responsibilities will have displays and informal seminars in the room they will maintain throughout the conference: visit the room too for informal discussion and general female-bonding.

A PROGRAM IS BEING PLANNED FOR NCFR AFFILIATED COUNCILS for Tuesday afternoon, with a luncheon on Thursday noon.

ROUND TABLE LUNCHEONS AND COFFEES continue popular. Make your choices early among those listed on the enclosure.

THE COUNSELING, EDUCATION, FAMILY ACTION, RESEARCH AND THEORY, AND SPECIAL EMPHASES SECTIONS will meet--you will be able to study the programs when the second installment of the Newsletter reaches you, and choose among a multitude of offerings. THE COUNSELING SECTION alone has about one hundred program participants giving papers, taking part in workshops, presenting an experiential action program, and participating in panels. A few of the topics include: The Use of Paraprofessional Counselors in Pre-Marital and Marital Counseling; Marital Intimacy and the Deadly Love-Anger Cycle; Alcoholism Counseling Within the Context of the Family System; Assertive Training for Women: An Alternative to Aggressiveness with Men; Spot Parenting--a TA Approach; Bioenergetics; Using Video Tape in Group Marriage Counseling; Family Life of the Single Person; Psychoanalysis is Alive and Well in Marriage and Family Counseling; and The End of Intimacy--A Comparison of Bereavement in Death and Divorce.

THE RESEARCH AND THEORY SECTION has sessions on Pairing; Parenting; An Objective Assessment of Family Interaction; Action Research; Sexual Behavior and Attitudes; Heterosexual Intimacy; Critical Issues; and Women, Research and Theory. (The latter is co-sponsored by the Family Action Section.) The important Annual Burgess Award Address will be given this year by *Paul Glick*, Bureau of the Census.

THE SPECIAL EMPHASES SECTION is devoting its meetings to Culture and the Family; Families of the Third World; Afro-American Marriage and Family Patterns; Cultural Adaptations; and Mexican-American Family Life.

THE EDUCATION SECTION is studying the following topics: The Applied Arts and Family Life Education; Theoretical Science and Research in Family Life Education; Relevant Applications for the Functional Teacher; The Applied Science of Teaching Family Life Education; Affective Vs Cognitive Family Life Education; Community Non-Classroom Family Life Education; and Problems and Tactics in Teaching in Professional Schools.

THE FAMILY ACTION SECTION has programs on The Aging and the Family; Alternative Life Styles; Family Communication--Utilizing TA with Indian Families; Programs Involving the Family; Women: Issues and Changes; Family Life Styles: Old and New; The Needs of Adolescents and Their Parents; Positive Aspects of the Divorce Workshop; Family Action in Practice, Family and Law; and Family Planning and Parenting.

CAROLYNNE KIEFFER, PRESIDENT OF THE MISSOURI COUNCIL ON FAMILY RELATIONS tells us about St. Louis--

Mention St. Louis and thoughts of baseball, beer, and Old Man River immediately come to mind. These are still hallmarks of the Gateway City, but there are also a host of historic, cultural, and entertainment attractions that you can see and enjoy while you are in St. Louis.

The Jefferson Hotel, NCFR conference headquarters, is located in downtown St. Louis. Within walking distance of the hotel is the magnificent 630-foot stainless steel Gateway Arch, marking St. Louis as the Gateway to the West. The Arch, the tallest man-made monument in the United States, continues to be one of the prime tourist attractions.

Downtown St. Louis is a tasteful blending of the old and the new. One is immediately taken with the striking skyline which bears ample testimony to the massive redevelopment program the city has undergone in recent years.

The nearby riverfront features a bevy of contemporary and historic attractions. The Basilica of St. Louis, King of France, commonly referred to as the Old Cathedral, stands majestically in the shadow of the Arch, and is the oldest cathedral west of the Mississippi.

Authentic sternwheel riverboats are permanently moored along the riverfront, housing dining and entertainment facilities. At night the strains of ragtime music echo along the carnival-like levee adding a distinctly nostalgic touch. Just adjacent to the riverfront is St. Louis' Old Courthouse, scene of the Dred Scott Trials and now a museum of western history.

The ultra-modern Busch Memorial Stadium is a few blocks from the riverfront in the heart of the downtown area. The 50,000 seat stadium is the home of the baseball, football, and pro soccer teams.

Music and theatre lovers have fine entertainment every week of the year in cultural St. Louis. The second largest symphony orchestra

in the country is based here, as well as an excellent philharmonic orchestra, both providing the ultimate in musical enjoyment. Regular Broadway productions are a featured bill of fare at St. Louis theatres.

Just west of the downtown area is the world renowned Forest Park, third largest urban park in the nation. The park was the scene of the 1904 Louisiana Purchase Exposition, more commonly known as the St. Louis World's Fair. Some 1,500 buildings were constructed in the park for the Fair, many of them still standing today.

In Forest Park you will find the world renowned zoo. Other Forest Park attractions include the City Art Museum, the McDonnell Planetarium, the Jefferson Memorial, and for nature lovers, the Jewel Box and Climatron.

Visitors to St. Louis delight at the range of dining possibilities. The city that first introduced the hot dog and ice cream cone to the nation in 1904 offers everything imaginable to the discriminating gourmet.

St. Louis is also the home of the Anheuser Busch Brewery--the largest in the world. The brewery gives free guided tours daily, and the famed Clydesdale horses are stabled at the brewery.

AND THE POST-CONFERENCE OFFERINGS.....

The workshop, Family Realities in Fiction and Art, which is sponsored by NCFR as a post-conference educational opportunity in St. Louis, will be of interest to educators, librarians, counselors, and others who seek to use the humanities for insights into the interaction of women and men and between the generations. *Rose Somerville's* new anthology, Intimate Relationships: Marriage, Family, and New Lifestyles Through Literature (Prentice-Hall) and its accompanying Teacher Guide will be out in time for the workshop, and will serve as a discussion focus. Enrollment will be limited to 20, and hopefully there will be some balance of the sexes to enhance discussion and to encourage use of fiction by varied sexes, ages, and disciplines. The fee will be \$25, with \$5 additional for materials. The workshop will start at 1:00 pm on Saturday, October 26, and continue until the group cries "Uncle" that evening. The Sunday session will begin at 9:00 am and continue at least until lunchtime and longer if the group desires it. Please send registration and checks to: *Rose M. The Workshop, Human Sexuality, will be led by *Harold and Louise Minor, Southeastern Family Forum*. The Saturday session will run from 1:00 pm through 10:00 pm, and the Sunday session from 9:00 am through 4:00 pm.

The workshop agenda will be built from the concerns and dynamic interaction of the participants. Group exercises, non-verbal experiences, audio-visuals, group discussion, and reflection on the process and philosophy will be part of the

design.

Goals of the workshop include helping participants (1) identify their personal attitudes and feelings in a supportive, accepting atmosphere; (2) gain increased acquaintance and comfort with a broad range of sexual behaviors; (3) explore relationships between intimacy, love, and sex; (4) achieve greater ease in communication about sexuality; (5) discover insights related to sexual function and dysfunction; (6) experience and understand the importance of group interaction in sex education; and (7) experience and understand the use of explicit materials in professional leader development in the field of human sexuality.

The workshop is limited to 30 participants accepted in order of application. Fee of \$28.00 should accompany application. TO NCFR MEMBERS
FROM NORMAN LOBSENZ

As you may know, I have been named Chairman of the NCFR Public Relations Committee. During the next year and a half I will be working on various long range ideas as well as on immediate publicity tied to the Annual Meeting and to other activities of both the organization and its members.

The purpose of this memo is to ask your cooperation in supplying me and the other members of the Committee with developments that may lend themselves to publicity. For example, if you publish a book; have an article appear in a major periodical; complete an interesting or important project; or do anything else which may be considered news-worthy--then I would appreciate knowing about it. If it proves feasible, the Committee will try to get this information into the press as a means of publicizing the NCFR.

I don't mean to suggest that everything that everyone does will be worth a news release; or that if a news release is indeed sent out it will appear anywhere, since of course we have no control over what editors choose to print. However, if we get a constant flow of this material it may lend itself to all sorts of public relation concepts which may prove useful both to you and the organization.

I would also like to have your reaction to two other ideas for public relations: (1) It seems to me that one of the major problems in publicizing the NCFR is that not enough people are familiar with the organization's name,

purposes or identity. I think this situation could be helped, at least in a small way, if each of you would identify yourselves as "a member of the NCFR" whenever you are interviewed by a reporter, are called upon to speak, or are otherwise in the public eye. (2) For the future, assuming costs are feasible, it might be worthwhile creating another Directory of Members--classified by their geographical location and by their special field of interest. This Directory could then be made available to people in the media who need, from time to time, to call on family life experts for quotes and comments. I would appreciate any reaction you have to this suggestion.

INTEGRATING COMMUNICATION SKILLS INTO FUNCTIONAL MARRIAGE AND FAMILY COURSES
with Jim Maddock, Ph.D. and Sherod Miller, Ph.D.
