The Education Section of NCFR and the Utah Council on Family Relations are sponsoring a pre-conference workshop in Family Life Education, August 13-20, at the University of Utah, Division of Continuing Education. THE NCFR TASK FORCE ON AGING

For the past two months, the Task Force on Aging has continued to focus on arrangements for our participation in the Salt Lake City Meeting. We asked the Section chairpersons to let us help develop plans for giving appropriate emphasis in their programs to the concerns of aging people and their families, and the response has been generous. We have been offered "prime time" to present issues and/or problems in the field of aging related to the work of each Section.

Our other news includes some statistics. Since we last reported, we have gained five new members, each bringing to the Task Force a kind of expertise that tremendously strengthens our total effort: *Carolyn Cable Carter*, soon to become director of Neighborhood Special Services and Programs for the Council of Jewish Elderly in Chicago; *James De Burger*, professor of sociology, University of Louisville, Louisville, Kentucky; *Jerry Passmore*, director of Guilford Coordinating Council on Aging, Greensboro, North Carolina office; *Catherine Rockwood*, who teaches "Aging and the Family" at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb; and *Margaret Slingerland*, teacher of "Family Living and Consumer Economics" in an inner city high school in Detroit.

There is a kind of ferment within the Task Force itself that is gradually bringing together people with similar interests. We are not assigning jobs to anyone, but as members volunteer we help them to make contact with others who share their concerns and want to do something about them. This kind of spontaneity in program development seems to be working well.

Presently, we have two needs that NCFR members can help us meet. The committee working on the Position Papers is still eager to have you tell them what areas you think should be covered in the "state of the field" survey. (See *Tim Brubaker's* announcement on this page of the Newsletter).

Our second need is a problem of logistics. The materials coming in to us from research centers, community programs for the elderly, and other sources, is exciting, innovative, and voluminous. Please keep it coming, but tell us where you think it should be deposited to do the most good. We will bring as much of it as we can to Salt Lake City; after that, where should it go? Among these materials are a variety of attractive brochures describing successful programs for the elderly; reports of national and state organizations, public and private; descriptions of local programs of research and service, a few organized and maintained by senior citizens themselves. As we study this "literature," we get, more and more strongly, the feeling that here is a national movement-in-the-making, with tremendous potential for enriching the lives of people of all ages, in all parts of our country. We will be delighted to hear from anyone who would like to take charge of these precious resources.

Arrangements are complete for the one-day symposium in Washington on family decision-making when this involves the future of aging family members. We have represented NCFR on the coordinating committee for the three organizations sponsoring this: The American Home Economics Association, The National Council on Family Relations, and the National Council on the Aging. The proceedings will be recorded and summaries made available.

In this connection, we would like to say something

here about Operation Independence, a project under the umbrella of the National Council on the Aging. It has been developed by a Steering Committee representing nearly 150 national organizations working for independent living for the aged, in short, NVOILA. It is designed "to bring national voluntary organizations, volunteers, and local private and public agencies into full collaboration with the new planning and service delivery efforts of the Administration on Aging and state and area aging units." Through this program, communities, especially small towns and rural areas, have "an opportunity to analyze the unmet needs of those senior citizens who are most vulnerable, and then to plan and implement clusters of in-home or community services that promote independent living for older persons." (Quotes are from the NVOILA Newsletter of October 1974). For more information, write *Marjorie A. Collins, Operation Independence Director, NCOA, 1828 L Street Northwest, Washington, D.C. 20037.*

Six members of the Task Force on Aging are participating in the 1975 International Groves Conference, in Dubrovnik, Yugoslavia, on changing sex roles in family and society. A POST-CONFERENCE WORKSHOP

FAMILY SCULPTURE TECHNIQUES

conducted by Larry and Joan Constantine

Saturday, August 23, 1:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m.

Family sculpture is a body of powerful therapeutic techniques gaining rapidly in popularity among marriage and family counselors and therapists.

As originally developed by *Dr. David Kantor* and elaborated by colleagues at Boston State Hospital, sculpture is a systematic body of tools for accessing a person's unarticulated maps or metaphorical representations of the complex relationship structures in which the person is embedded. Through the symbolic and metaphorical use of real space, through "sculpting" other people in position, movement, gesture, and posture, the client is helped in creating a living tableau embodying essential features of their interrelationships. Externalized as an active spatial metaphor, these personal understandings become accessible to both client and therapist and amenable to verification and modification. Thus sculpture serves as a powerful evaluation or diagnostic tool for all manner of relationship systems as well as a pathway to intervention. Sculpture is firmly grounded in an underlying rationale which takes into account not only what is known of the structure of family systems, but the structure of the brain as well.

This workshop is aimed at providing training in the use of the full array of spatial and action techniques comprising family sculpture. The concepts and techniques of spatial mapping and the metaphorical use of space to map complex relationship structures will be explored both experientially and cognitively.

The workshop is open to practicing therapists and counselors and to students nearing completion of training in preparation for practice. Participants will have an opportunity to experience and experiment with the various forms and uses of family sculpture. The material for this exploration will be the workshop participants themselves.

The leaders have extensive experience designing and conducting workshops, including workshops on family sculpture both here and in Australia. They both trained at Boston Family Institute under *Dr. David Kantor*, the developer of family sculpture. *Joan Constantine* is a Family Therapist in private practice. *Larry* is a Clinical Instructor in Psychiatry at Tufts University, training and supervising family therapists at Boston State Hospital.

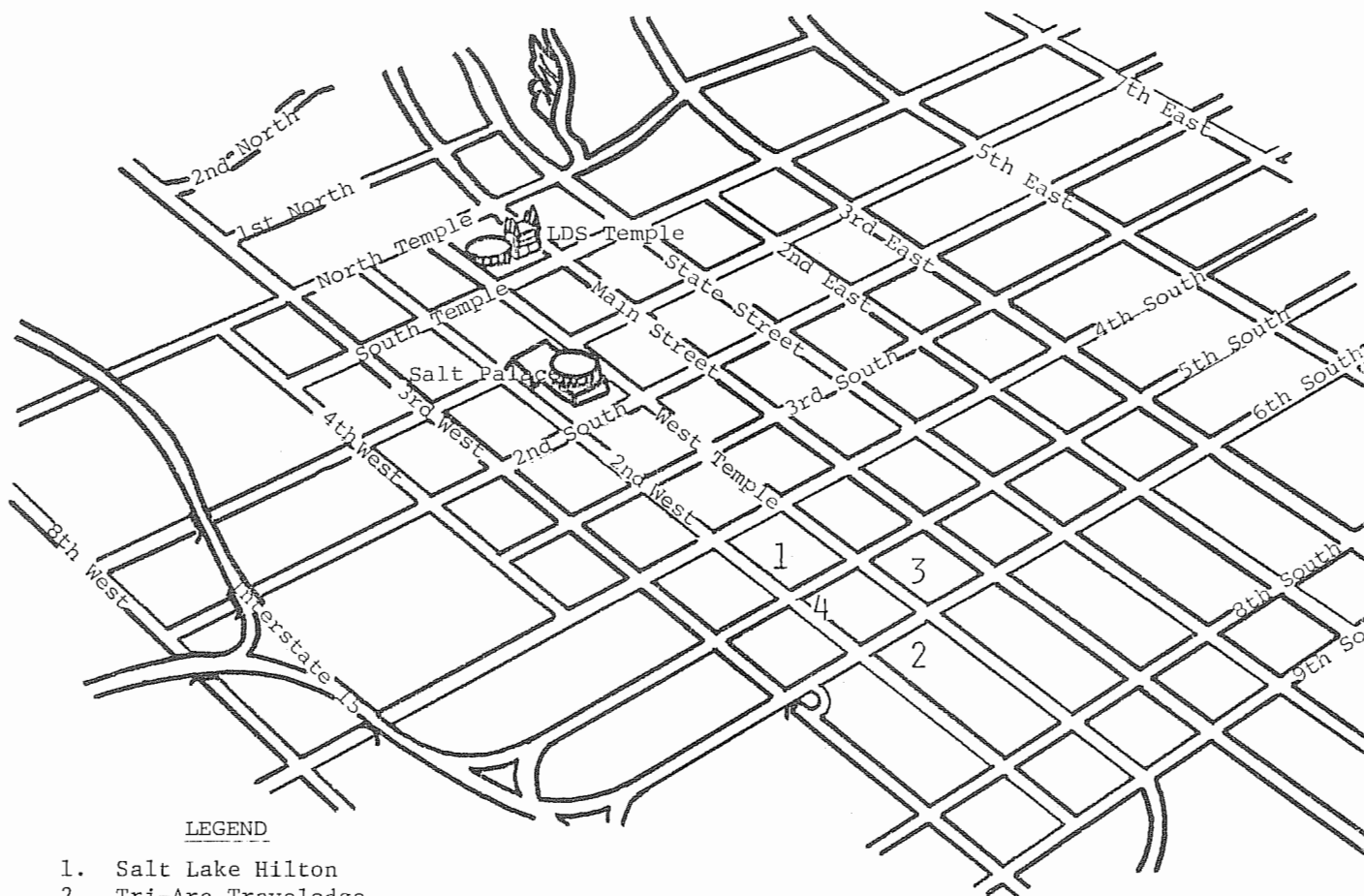

NOTE TO COUNSELING SECTION MEMBERS

Thank you for answering my survey questions. In response to your requests for workshops which were no-fee and a part of the counseling section program, I have scheduled one all-day workshop focusing on family therapy and one half-day workshop concerning the development of therapeutic skills for Friday, August 22, 1975.
