LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS

The 1976 Annual Meeting has been re-scheduled for the Roosevelt Hotel, Madison Avenue and 45th Street.

The hotel is in the heart of the city, connected directly to Grand Central Station, one block from Fifth Avenue, three from the United Nations. Two of the finest restaurants in New York are in the hotel, and all kinds of transportation is right at the door.

The hotel is extending very, very special rates because of the rescheduling caused by the chain itself. These rates apply for the entire week, so come early and stay for a truly exciting vacation.

You will all receive registration materials directly from the conference coordinators, but a brief preview of some of the scheduled events follows.

The theme for the 1976 Annual Meeting is "Family and Sex Roles." Plenary speakers include Lois Wladis Hoffman, University of Michigan; Robert Bell, Temple University and LaTrobe University, Australia; Jay Mann, University of California, San Francisco; and Carlfred B. Broderick, University of Southern California, and NCFR President.

The Counseling, Education, Research and Theory, and Family Action Sections, as well as the plenary sessions, will look at the provocative issues which the new perspectives on sex roles raise.

There will be special meetings for student members; the International Liaison Committee is arranging a session on the international aspects of the theme (see page 12 for a late news release from this committee); the NCFR Affiliated Councils will hold sessions; there will be a Book Exhibit, Films and Filmstrips, Round

Tables, Task Force meetings, and Pre- and Post-Conference Workshops.

SECTION NEWS AND NOTES

RESEARCH AND THEORY

The Focus on Family and Sex Roles will be handled in the Research and Theory Section at the Annual Meeting in two major clusters: Relationships, and Specific Problems.

The Relationship Sections will discuss: (1) Husbands and Fathers; (2) Wives and Mothers; (3) Children, Siblings, and Parents; (4) In-law Relationships.

Specific Problems will include: (1) Power and Sex Roles; (2) Racial and Ethnic Factors in Sex Roles; (3) Love, Sexuality and Sex Roles; (4) Family Crises and Sex Roles (Illness, Death, Unemployment, Infidelity, and Separation, including Prisoners of War); (5) Cross Cultural Research and Sex Roles.

Bernard Farber, 1975 Recipient of the Burgess Award, will present the Burgess Award Address--always a conference highlight.

A summary section, The Enrichment of Family Theory Through Sex Roles Change, will be held.

FAMILY ACTION

Interest in Task Forces activities has been high; however, Task Force chairpersons are still seeking to increase membership from the Family Action membership. The project of the Task Force on Income Maintenance, chaired by Roger H. Rubin, University of Maryland, has been completed. The members of this Task Force are to be highly commended for presenting a scholarly and significant research paper dealing with poverty, assistance programs, non-cash supportive programs, economics and the family and other pertinent areas of social concern. A number of recommendations and suggestions for implementation are offered and are worthy of NCFR membership consideration.

Position papers and abstracts for possible presentation at the NCFR annual meeting in New York are being received; however many more are necessary in order to cover the wide spectrum of interest among our membership, and to insure quality and appropriateness to the general meeting theme. THE NCFR TASK FORCE ON LEGISLATION AND SOCIAL POLICY: In late 1975 the National Council on Family Relations Task Force on Legislation and Social Policy was reorganized. Its major mission is to serve as the political eyes and ears of the Council, keeping up-to-date on legislation affecting the family at all levels of government, and to serve as a catalyst in facilitating the formulation, introduction, passage and implementation of favorable family legislation, and the removal of unfavorable family legislation. During the first year the Task Force hopes to reach four objectives:

1. Organization of the Task Force:
 - a. Membership: In addition to a small, select group of NCFR members, legislative specialists at the Federal level will be recruited from the House and Senate, the Executive and Judiciary Branches, and one or two from lobbying groups interested in family legislation.
 - b. Structure: Develop a logical and efficient organizational structure within the Task Force organized, for example, by interest area, specialization, level of government (local, state, Federal), and region of the country.
 2. Visibility of the National Council on Family Relations: Initiate publicity campaign to educate legislators about NCFR, establish permanent contacts with their staffs, and offer technical assistance of NCFR membership on matters affecting family life.
 3. Coordination with other organizations: Develop permanent and viable ties with sister organizations to share resources and to coordinate efforts.
 4. Enactment of the Family Research Acts of 1975: Assist the American Home Economics Association in passage of Senate Bill 2250 introduced in July.

THE TASK FORCE ON AGING: First a very nice piece of news. On February 5, 1976, NCFR received a Citation from the National Council on Aging for Task Force help with Operation Independence. This is a project in a program sponsored by NCOA, called NVOILA, which means National Voluntary Organizations for Independent Living for the Aged.

The specific reason for the award was the symposium on the caretaker role of the family held in Washington, D.C. last May under the joint auspices of NCFR, the National Council on the Aging, and the American Home Economics Association. AHEA was similarly honored. The proceedings of the symposium are to be published in popular form, hopefully in one of the family magazines sold widely in shopping centers.

Arrangements for Task Force on Aging participation in the annual NCFR meeting are almost complete. A great deal of interest has been expressed in the pre-conference workshop on Aging and Family Life Education mentioned in the December 1975 Newsletter, so this is set up for October 19, 1976, at the Roosevelt Hotel in New York. It is being organized as an opportunity for members to discuss, in depth, objectives, basic concepts, and philosophical approaches to the treatment of aging in programs of education for family living. Catherine Rockwood, Northern Illinois University, will be in charge, assisted by Jane Oyer, Michigan State University, and Dorothy Fruit, Kent State University. Vivian Wood, Associate Director for Training and Education, Faye McBeath Institute on Aging and Adult Life, University of Wisconsin at Madison, will be the consultant; Rose Somerville

and the Task Force on Women's Rights and Responsibilities may be with us for at least part of the time.

There will be no formal presentation of papers; instead we are planning an exciting exchange of ideas, insights, and experiences. To facilitate this exchange, enrollment will be limited, so we urge those of you who would like to join this workshop to register early with Dr. Rockwood, 208 Fairmont Drive, DeKalb, Illinois 60115.

The proposed workshop on the Position Papers will probably be postponed. There is so much recent, new material in the field of aging that it will take more time than we thought to relate our review to what has been, or is being done. More about this later.

We wish we could give you a full report of what Task Force members are doing. Those of you concerned with programs for the urban elderly will not want to miss the two-part February 1976 issue of the GERONTOLOGIST, which is all about aging in the big cities, with a case study of Chicago. You will also be interested in an interim report from Ralph Johnson entitled PROJECT ELDERLY. This is a survey of job possibilities for the older adult in the labor market in Metropolitan Miami, supported by a grant from the Edna McConnell Clark Foundation to the Miami-Dade Community College.

The next annual meeting of the Gerontological Society will be October 13-17, at the New York Hilton. Write to the Gerontological Society, Suite 520, One Dupont Circle, Northwest, Washington, DC 20036 if you are thinking about combining this with the NCFR annual meeting, October 19-23, and need more information.

And finally, one more bit of news: On the afternoon of the 20th of October, the Task Force on Aging has arranged a session to be moderated by Lee R. Steiner, the clinical psychologist whose radio program has been outstanding in New York for 15 years. This program will be a dialog between elderly people and representatives of some of the agencies which serve them. Are there problems of communication here? Role changes that our society is not supporting? If so, what can be done about that?

TASK FORCE ON POPULATION AND FAMILY PLANNING: A CALL FOR PARTICIPANTS: The 1976 theme of the Task Force on Population and Family Planning is, Adolescent Parents: A Special Case of the Unplanned Family. Every year the United States records nearly one-half million births to school age parents; although about one-half of these parents are married by the time of the birth, the divorce rate is four times greater for this age group. TASK FORCE ON WOMEN'S RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES: Since the first meeting of this Task Force in Estes Park, Colorado, in 1971, there have been many programs and papers at each annual meeting of NCFR (Portland, 1972; Toronto, 1973; St. Louis, 1974; and Salt Lake City, 1975) focused on expanding and improving curriculum, counseling, and research to take account of changing sex roles. Organizational structure has been loose: we have not had a formal Task Force membership but have counted on informal commitment and interest.

It has been suggested that it might strengthen the Task Force in the work that lies ahead if we were to follow the procedures of other Task Forces in the Family Action Section and create a membership list of those who are currently teaching, researching, or counseling in areas that pertain to women's status in the home, job, and community. To be included in any Task Force roster, the NCFR member must be a member of the Family Action Section, which, like all NCFR Sections, requires dues of \$3.00 a year.

NCFR AFFAIRS

If those NCFR members who are or will become members of the Family Action Section and are interested in membership in the Task Force on Women's Rights and Responsibilities would send word to the Chairperson of the Task Force, *Rose Somerville*, it would help in decision-making on this proposed change.

With the theme of the October 1976 conference of NCFR in New York City so directly related to the Task Force's interests, it would be appropriate to have a membership meeting in the hospitality room being assigned to us. One item on the agenda could be the possibility of issuing a Task Force Newsletter two or three times a year to keep the membership abreast of developments, legislative and educational, on the national and international scene, as well as cover news of members' activities in these regards. The Divorce Task Force charges each member \$3.00 for such a Newsletter. At our New York meeting we would need to reach some conclusion as to whether there are enough NCFR members who would subscribe to allow printing and mailing expenses to be met. We may decide to limit the number of issues and the format to reduce the subscription price. Opinions are welcome now, although the final decision may not be made until the membership meets in October. Ideas as to how the hospitality room may be used in New York without competing with NCFR regular sessions, a new caution communicated to Task Forces, will be gratefully received. ERA: The Board of Directors of the National Council on Family Relations supports ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, and urges its members and other citizens to join them in this support. At present ERA has been ratified by 34 states, only 4 states short of the number necessary for it to become the 27th Amendment.

It is the view of the Board that passage of this amendment would: (1) Guarantee full rights of citizenship to women as well as men while preserving every right to privacy and stylistic pluralism. (2) Ensure equal hiring and promotional practices and equal pay and benefits regardless of sex. (3) Prohibit sexual discrimination in extension of credit, and in the right to own and manage property and to enter into contracts. (4) Establish sexual equity in the areas of child custody, child support and alimony. (5) Require equal treatment in admissions, financial assistance and use of facilities in federal supported educational institutions. (6) End sexual discrimination in the administering of criminal justice.

We hope to start a New England-wide Newsletter that will cover events relevant to persons in the family field, and keep people in touch. The Connecticut Council will work in conjunction with Councils on the Family from other New England states. Once we have a list of names, we'll be contacting you with more information.

I am still running into undergraduate majors in family studies who have not heard of NCFR. ALABAMA: The annual conference of the Alabama Council on Family Relations was held March 4-5. The theme for the general sessions was "Families: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow." Paper sessions focused on research dealing with Alabama families and programs serving families in the state.
