president's column

It is trite but true: time passes rapidly when one's activities seem worthwhile and enjoyable. That is my experience now as my term as president is winding down. I am recalling a variety of reactions ranging from puzzlement and naivete in the question, "President of what?" when approached by the chair of the nominating committee, humility rather than elation when elections were final, awe during the early stages as president-elect, action and now frustration that one year is a relatively short time for fruition

of many ideas and hopes. Already, it is time for my final newsletter message.

I do want this to be personal to each member. I know many of you individually and would like to know others. I wanted to involve each one in our efforts this year, but that was impossible. My concern is that some may feel discouraged and distant by not having an active role. Please keep trying. When we have known your thoughts and suggestions, most have been incorporated into planning by various committees, even when you did not know. Some of the new and more creative of those committees are Long Range Planning/Future Development (Carolyn Love, chair), Standards and Certification (Kenneth Davidson, chair), Media Involvement (Nancy Buerkel-Rothfuss, chair), and Constitution and By-Laws Revisions (Helen Hartness, chair). Additionally, there is all the work of the affiliated councils (Betty Barber and Sander Latts, representatives) and several other ad hoc and standing committees. All of them will be functioning at the annual meeting where you may learn about developments and discuss your interests in person. You can make important contributions in this manner and, in some cases, become directly involved.

Since the May Newsletter was published, two statements, one on Title X reauthorization, and another on the marriage penalty

tax, have been approved by mail ballot of the NCFR Board of Directors, and mailed to appropriate Congresspeople. The statements are reproduced on pages 20 and 21 of this Newsletter.

The annual meeting is the highlight of our services and activities because we are together to share and learn from each other both in the program and in informal associations. Opportunities for contacts with recognized scholars from one's own or other disciplines are invaluable; but it is also stimulating to meet bright, enthusiastic students and young professionals who are just getting launched in the field. Interactions between members in applied studies and services and those who are primarily theorists and researchers can be mutually beneficial and invigorating for all. For me, the annual meeting is continuing education in its finest combination of learning, socializing, and inspiration. I begin to feel excited just thinking about it! (If you are new or inactive, come this year to observe ways to become a more active participant hereafter.)

The program this year is jammed full and the content is outstanding! There is something—and more—for everybody's interests, including lots of fun. (Sharon Price-Bonham as program chair and all the local arrangements people will see to that. And where could it be better than in Milwaukee?) I am especially pleased that a plenary session is devoted to religion, a topic which was prominent in family life education in earlier years; another will be presented by Elise Boulding whose life and work I have long regarded from a distance; and another will have an international orientation.

In addition to the regular theory construction and research methodology workshop, the pre- and post-conference workshops are fine complements to the program. Work-related issues greatly affect most families. The pre-conference workshop on "Families and the Working Environment: An Examination of Two Current Programs and a Review of the Field" recognizes that fact and is one way NCFR has responded to the top recommendations of the White House Conference on Families. The post annual meeting conference, "Toward Family Wellness," is a positive and practical experience for couples and families. There is substantial program if you come early, stay late, or can only attend in the middle.

Let's get together in Milwaukee in October. I am looking forward to seeing you there.

PLENARY SESSIONS Opening Plenary Session

Elise Boulding, Chair of the Sociology Department, Dartmouth College, will be the opening plenary speaker, Wednesday, October 14, 7:30 p.m. Her address is entitled, "Familia Faber: The Family as Maker of the Future."

Dr. Boulding was formerly at the University of Colorado at

Boulder. She received her Ph.D. from the University of Michigan.

A Sociologist with a global view, Dr. Boulding has undertaken numerous transnational and comparative cross-national studies on conflict and peace, development, family life, and women in society. Her work in the area of future studies dates from 1961 when she translated, from the Dutch, Fred Polak's classic work, *Image of the Future*. She has worked internationally on problems of peace and world order both as a scholar and as an activist.

She is a member of the governing board of the United Nations University, and is a member of the Commission for UNESCO. She has also served as a member of the Commission on Proposals for a National Academy of Peace and Conflict Resolution.

Her major historical study of women's changing social, economic and political roles over four millenia is entitled The Underside of History: A View of Women Through Time (Boulder, Colorado: Westview Press, 1976). Other books which she has authored or coauthored include Handbook of International Data on Women (1977), Woman in the Monastery Kitchen (1976), Children's Rights and the Wheel of Life (1976), Bibliography on World Conflict and Peace (1979), The Social System of the Planet Earth, and Women and Social Costs of Development: Two Case Studies.

Families Act on Religion: Religion Acts on Families is the Topic for the Second Plenary Session

This session will be held Thursday, October 15, at 10:15 a.m. Participants include Donald B. Conroy, Mary Cline Detrick, Jerome Folkman, and Letha Dawson Scanzoni. Brent Barlow, Brigham Young University, is chair.

Donald Conroy, Director of the National Institute for the Family, Washington, D.C., received a License in Sacred Theology from the Gregorian (Jesuit) University, Rome, Italy, and a Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh. He served in three parishes in the Diocese of Greensburg, Pennsylvania, as Representative for Family Life at the United States Catholic Conference, and worked with the Catholic Coordinating Committee for the White House Conference on Families. He has taught in the Theology Departments of Duquesne University and Catholic University and has written extensively in the area of family issues. He became director of the National Institute for the Family in 1980.

Mary Cline Detrick, ordained Minister, Church of the Brethren, received her Master of Divinity and Christian Education degree from Bethany Theological Seminary, Oak Brook, Illinois. She is presently employed at the Church of the Brethren, General Board, Elgin, Illinois, and is on the staff for Life Cycle Ministries, Person Awareness and Youth/Young Adult Ministries. In her work she serves as a consultant, workshop leader, trainer of leaders, and resource person for the Church of the Brethren. Life Cycle Ministries include youth, ministries with families, singles enrichment, marriage enrichment, and aging concerns. The Person Awareness portfolio promotes liberation and identity concerns of women and men.

She has also served as a member of the National Council of Churches Justice for Women Group, the Religious Committee for the Equal Rights Amendment, and the National Advisory Committee for the White House Conference on Families. In addition, she was an official observer for the World Council of Churches to the United Nations Mid-Decade Conference on Women in Copenhagen, Denmark.

Jerome D. Folkman is Rabbi Emeritus, Temple Israel, Columbus, Ohio, Adjunct Professor, Department of Sociology, Ohio State University, Visiting Professor at Otterbein College, and Lecturer in

Religious Studies, Pontifical College Josephinum. He attended graduate school at the University of Michigan, received a Ph.D. degree from Ohio State University and a D.D. degree from Hebrew Union College. He served as Rabbi at Temple Beth Israel, Jackson, Michigan, Temple Emmanuel, Grand Rapids, Michigan, and Temple Israel, Columbus, Ohio. Included in his many activities are Chair, Committee on Marriage, Home, and Family, Central Conference of American Rabbis; President, Ohio Council on Family Relations; Executive Committee, NCFR; Member of the Board of Governors, Hebrew Union College; Member of the Executive Board of Central Conference of American Rabbis; Member of the Editorial Board, "Highlights for Children"; and member of the Board of Trustees, United Community Council. He has received the B'nai B'rith, Sanford Lakin Award for outstanding contributions to the cause of Judaism and the general community; the "Outstanding Contribution to Education" Award, Central Ohio Chapter, Pi Lambda Theta; the Governor's Award, State of Ohio; Excellence in Teaching Award, College of Arts and Sciences, Ohio State University; and the Distinguished Citizenship Award, Ohio State University.

Letha Dawson Scanzoni is a full-time professional writer, specializing in religion and social issues. Her articles have appeared in, among others, "The Christian Century," "Christianity Today," "Daughters of Sarah," "The Reformed Journal," "Medical Aspects of Human Sexuality," "Radix," and "The Other Side."

She has been a guest lecturer at the Institute for Sex Research at Indiana University, the 1975 "Continental Congress on the Family," the 1975 and 1978 conferences of the Evangelical Women's Caucus, and the "Human Sexuality Workshop" at Indiana University Southeast. She chaired a plenary session of the special inter-faith gathering of religious leaders meeting in Washington, D.C. on "The Religious Leaders Consultation on the World Conference of the United Nations Decade for Women, 1980." She served as a featured speaker and panel member at the Minnesota Governor's Conference on "Battered Women: The Religious Response."

Her topics usually relate to gender roles, self-esteem and human potential, human relationships, feminism, marriage and family living sex education, and sex ethics.

For example, although an article outlining the application of a particular multivariate technique to some aspect of Family Studies research would not be considered appropriate for this issue, an article examining the nature of the relationship between that same particular multi-variate technique and one of the unresolved methodological or statistical issues central to Family Studies research such as the interdependency of family attitudes and behavior would be.

In addition, literature reviews, overviews, or articles that are substantively philosophical in content will not be considered.

washington report

The Washington scene remains muggy and indecisive. At a June 3 Coalition for Families Meeting, Jim Steinberg, Legal Council, Democratic Minority, Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources, presented a clear picture of the options open to the liberal minority, and these range from few to none. That is, each possible strategy was blocked in some way. The liberal goals would be to retain categorical programs with their various requirements and safeguards.

A second speaker, Dierdre Reimer, Staff Director, Committee on Executive Management, National Governor's Association, took the group to task as to why they mistrusted states and governors. She pointed out that states already spend billions, and are willing to tax as needed. The federal share has been small in most of the affected programs. She advised that if the agencies represented were concerned about particular client groups, then they should get busy in the state capitols. The process works there just as it does on the federal level.

This presentation was followed by one from John Carr, formerly with the White House Conference on Families, and now with the Center for Community Change. He is heading up a coalition to oppose block grants, and he was much more optimistic than Steinberg that it might be possible to stop them. His efforts focus more on the House, the only source of liberal strength. The danger, though, is of some deadlock between the two Houses.

A total of 68 programs of various sizes and importance are likely to be folded into four block grants. We suggest that NCFR members and state affiliates should be active in discussing the possible impact of this in their own states and communities.

The Coalition presented a draft of a position paper for possible support, saying that the impact of block grants on families has not been assessed and that they recommended a 2-year study period before the block grants should become effective. However, Dierdre Reimer had noted that the Governors requested a one-year phase-in which was denied. The current Senate bill allows the Governors an option on this; they can do it either way.

Within the affected agencies, there is great uncertainty over the future federal role, particularly as to whether they have a part in it. We certainly hope that by next quarter there will be something definite to say, no matter what it is.

The NCFR Public Policy Committee supports this Coalition proposal informally but does not feel that there is time to refer it to the Board. We have also received requests for a position paper to support a removal of the "marriage tax" and an inquiry concerning the present status of the Family Protection Act.

The NCFR Board of Directors has taken action on the former, with letters to appropriate Congresspeople. The Family Protection Act is apt to be around for the next two years, as a major piece of family focussed legislation. In order to be passed, it will probably be broken up into smaller pieces and attached to other bills as amendments. U. S. Senator Roger Jepsen (R-IA), a co-author of the Family Protection Act of 1981, is expected to discuss it at the NCFR Annual Meeting in Milwaukee.

Letters Sent by NCFR Board to Congress

Marriage Penalty Tax

The National Council on Family Relations is a membership organization of 5,400 professionals concerned about families and their needs. As such, we applaud the attention that is now being given to the marriage penalty tax. We encourage you to be sensitive to the impact of public policies on families and to develop policies that are supportive rather than destructive. We encourage you to review the marriage penalty tax to ameliorate its negative consequences. We would be happy to be of assistance to you on this or other family related matters.

Title X Reauthorization

The National Council on Family Relations is a membership organization of 5,400 professionals concerned about tamilies and their needs. As such, we strongly support the reauthorization and adequate funding of Title X of the Public Health Service Act of 1970.

There are humanitarian and economic reasons for the endorsement of this program. First, it is a voluntary program which makes family planning information, counseling and services available to those who seek these services. Second, the program has, throughout its history, supported the practice that decisions regarding family planning services should be made with the informed consent of the individual, based on the provision of complete and unbiased information. Third, the program, by serving more than 4,500,000 persons in 1978, demonstrated the urgent need for these services among the poor and the young in our

country. Fourth, research has documented that each dollar spent on family planning through Title X in a given year yields a savings of \$2.00 in health and welfare costs in the following year and a savings of \$2.90 if the client is a teenager.

The National Council on Family Relations recognizes the importance of voluntary family planning services to the health and well-being of individuals and their families. Because Title X of the Public Health Service Act is the major legislation targeted to family planning services, we urge Congress to reauthorize this legislation, including both the services and research provisions, with funding levels adequate to expand the services to include the 7,000,000 poor women and sexually active teenagers who cannot receive care at present funding levels.

We oppose the consolidation of Title X into a block grant because this legislation has set standards for service provision which have made the program successful in meeting the needs of the poor and the young. We urge you to support the reauthorization of Title X and the provision of adequate funding to meet the needs of families in the U.S.

Note: Title X was kept by Congress as a categorical program.

NCFR family resource/referral center

As of August 1, library royalty fees will be \$25 per connect hour plus \$.05 per citation (the average search takes 15 minutes). Custom searches are the same base price, but we offer a special 10% discount to NCFR members.
