SINCE 1938 The National Council on Family Relations was founded in 1938 as an interprofessional group by Paul W. Sayre, Lawyer, Ernest W. Burgess, Sociologist, and others. Its first conference, held in New York City in 1938, stressed the **interprofessional** approach.

PURPOSE "The purpose of the National Council on Family Relations is to provide opportunities for organized groups, agencies, members of allied professions and individuals interested in family life to plan and act together voluntarily for the advancement of marriage and family life by means of consultation, conference and cooperation on the goals, needs and problems of marriage and family living."

The Council helps formulate sound proposals for the family through discussion by interested parties and groups. It does not implement such proposals.

The Council is interested in appraisal of action programs already in effect. It does not carry on counseling, education and research per se, but is interested in stimulating and encouraging the development of such areas.
