

Where do we go From Here? Implementation

Thank You's, Evaluations, and Wrap up,

Maxine Hammonds-Smith, CFLE

Through a collaborative effort with the Geriatric Education Centers from Texas and Minnesota, and the Minnesota Area Agency on Aging, this summit will examine the importance of bringing a family systems and family strengths perspective to the care of family members requiring long-term care and their family member caretakers. Both the impact and the contextual nature of long-term care and how family resilience can be supported will be examined. Family professionals have the potential to help health care systems overcome some of the cultural and educational obstacles that have traditionally limited medical treatments. Pulling together practitioners and scholars from geriatric services and family studies, the summit will focus on the changing needs of aging families from both a geriatric and family centered perspective. A dialogue will develop through workshops from these two perspectives on how to best prepare the family professionals of today and tomorrow to work with our aged populations as well as with other professionals serving them.







Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention: Prospects for 2000 and Beyond, **Stephen R. Jorgensen, Ph.D.**, 1999/2001 NCFR President

For 25 years, the federal government in the U.S. and numerous professional organizations

have riveted their attention on the "epidemic" of adolescent pregnancy, as it was labeled in 1976 by the Alan Guttmacher Institute. What have we learned from our intensive study of this form of adolescent risk-taking behavior made by the research and practitioner communities? This address will offer an analysis of the major variables associated with adolescent sexual and contraceptive behavior, pregnancy, and childbearing, and will issue predictions for the decade ahead with particular attention to adolescent pregnancy prevention interventions and their evaluation.

Stephen R. Jorgensen, is Director, School of Human Environmental Sciences, Dale Bumpers College of Agricultural Food and Life Sciences, University of Arkansas. He has actively served NCFR as Publications Vicepresident, Reuben Hill Award Committee, CFLE Committee on Standards for Certification; CFLE Review Committee; Family Relations Editor Search Committee; Nominating Committee; CFLE Task Force; Chair, JMF Editor Search Committee.



In 1996 she received the American Family Therapy Academy Award for Innovative Contributions to Family Research, the Faculty Medal for Outstanding Achievement, Penn State Univ., and a "Products of Compton" Award. She currently is on the Board of Behavioral, Cognitive, and Sensory Sciences for the Natl. Academy of Sciences, and is Director of the NIMH-sponsored Research Consortium and on Diversity, Family Processes, and Child Adolescent Mental Health and the Consortium's Multisite Postdoctoral Training Program. Her research explores the relationship between neighborhood contexts, poverty, intergenerational family processes, and mental health outcomes across the life course. She is currently involved in a four-year multisite collaborative study of the impact of welfare reform on families and children.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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Miscellaneous Notes

- For emergencies, leave the telephone number of the hotel, your schedule, and NCFR's number with your family and colleagues.
- Select clothes that create the image you want to project at the Conference. This is particularly important if you are using the Employment Matching Service. Also include clothes for exercise and all types of weather.

Actively Participate in Conference Activities

- Throughout a session, think of questions that you may want to ask the speaker during the question/answer period. Don't ask questions that give the impression that you weren't listening. Keep questions brief. Don't seize the stage for yourself and your own work.

Tips for Using the Employment Matching Service

- Follow directions explicitly when preparing your materials.
- Bring a supply of resumes and business cards with you. You may find new openings in addition to those listed through the Employment Matching Service.
- Send your Employment Matching Service materials to NCFR before the Conference so that you are listed in the alphabetic files. Inform colleagues you are looking for a job; they may give your name to prospective employers.

Be Assertive at the Conference

- Register at the Employment Matching Service on opening day and leave your hotel room number so you can be contacted if there is a message left for you. Keep returning - new jobs are posted daily.
 Leave messages on the board for those you wish to contact, and keep checking. If there is no response to your notes, leave a room message or ask colleagues to help you find them, but keep trying!

- Use the central sitting areas. These are great places for people you know to introduce you to people they know
- Exchange business cards when meeting new colleagues. Make notes
 on the back to remind yourself about significant information. Follow
 up with phone calls or notes after you return home.
- Share rooms. Staying with a group of people you know adds to the fun and lowers expenses. If you want to room with someone, but don't have a roommate, call the NCFR office.
- Stop in the Hospitality Center (Directors Row 2) and meet new people. Sign up to go out for "each person pay your own way" dine-arounds with leaders in the family field.

Keep Physically Fit, Mentally Alert, and Safe

- Make sure you get enough rest during the Conference. Fatigue is predictable due to a combination of late evenings, presentations, dinners, parties, early sessions, and meetings.
- Don't skip meals. Try to eat a balanced diet. Take workout gear. The hotel has indoor exercise equipment.
- Be safety-smart while at the Conference. 1) Don't wear your name badge outside the Conference facility. 2) Stay in groups when walking outdoors. 3) When you are in your room, keep the door locked and the deadbolt engaged at all times. If someone comes to your door, use the peephole to see who it is and call the front desk or security if the person says that he/she is on the hotel staff to see if the visit is authorized. 4) Be alert when riding an elevator by yourself 5) Leave valuables in hotel safe deposit boxes.
- Frequently check for messages at the Message Board. Call the hotel front desk for phone calls.


NCFR is the only professional organization focused solely on family research, policy, and practice.
