# **Rochester, NY Information**

## Historic Western New York and the Local Arrangements Committee Welcome You to the 2001 Annual Conference

#### Facts About the Rochester Area

Rochester is the 3rd largest city in New York and the 79th largest city in the U.S. The Partners for Livable Communities rated Rochester as one of the top 4 Most Livable Cities in America this decade! It is located within a 400-mile radius of 14 northeastern states, two Canadian provinces, and Washington, D.C. It is also the western gateway to the fabulous Finger Lakes Region and a day's drive from New York City.

#### **Historic African-American Connections**

Visitors will find a range of sites, exhibits, and informational sources available. Places associated with the famous orator and abolitionist Frederick Douglass are numerous. A nearby marker indicates the location of his family home (now gone), where John Brown, another famous historic figure, often visited. Downtown Rochester's Main Street yields information about the Underground Railroad; "The North Star" newspaper; and Austin Steward, a runaway slave who became one of the community's first black businessmen and property owners. Tour the Memorial African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church in the Corn Hill Neighborhood, founded in 1827 and the oldest black church in Rochester. Monroe Community Hospital features an ornate facade designed in the early 1930s by Thomas Boyde-the first African-American architect to work in the area. See Maplewood Park, where slaves boarded boats headed across Lake Ontario to Canada and freedom.

#### Birthplace of the Women's Rights Movement

This movement was born in 1848 when Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Jane Hunt, Mary Ann M'Clintock, Lucretia Mott, and Martha Wright organized the First Women's Rights Convention in Seneca Falls and presented a Declaration of Sentiments (including...*that all men and women are created equal.*) to an audience of 300 people. Twelve days later a second convention advocating women's rights was held in Rochester, and this social revolution gained a critically important "general." The woman who became the movement's voice, campaigned for women's rights, and was arrested for the "crime" of voting became one of Rochester's most famous residents--Susan B. Anthony. Visit her home and see first-hand the working areas where the women worked as they sought to obtain women's right to vote.

#### Don't Miss Experiencing These Unique-to Rochester Destinations

\* Explore the past, present, and future of photography or take a one-hour guided tour of the **George Eastman House and International Museum of Photography and Film** which features changing photography exhibits. \* Take a self-guided walking tour through an **historic residential neighborhood** such as Corn Hill, Park Avenue, or East Avenue and look for artistic benches and other works of art in the Grove Place neighborhood near the Eastman Theatre.

• Visit Frontier's Mini-Museum of Telephone History with its antique telephones, equipment, and historic photos. • Experience Sesame Street and other family-fun exhibits at Kids-to-Kids, or browse through the largest collection of unique dolls, toys, and miniatures in the world, both at the Strong Museum.

\* Visit the historic **Memorial Art Gallery**. \* Trips to the stars in the **Strassenburgh Planetarium** are another popular pastime.

\* The Rochester Museum & Science Center has Seneca exhibits and artifacts that date from around 1550 to 1820. Historic displays, audio-visual presentations, and hands-on activities illustrate Seneca Iroquois traditions and concerns from saving their land to retaining their language and culture to making a living in today's modern world.

This session will unveil the Cornell Community Study Report, a study being released at the Work/Life Summit. The report summarizes survey data provided by 631 couples (1534 individuals), interviewed in 1999-2000. All of the participants live in 57 middle class neighborhoods in Upstate New York, concentrated in the Rochester, Syracuse, and Ithaca areas. Study participants offered detailed information on their work, family, and community experiences, their reasons for living in upstate New York, and their future plans. Additionally, the report outlines demographic shifts, drawing upon data in the 2000 Census, and implications these changes have for community leaders, employers, and residents in upstate New York. The panel will discuss the various aspects of the report and answer questions from the audience.



The 6 billion dollar Trust, with an education mission to serve families and children of Native Hawaiian Ancestry operates three K-12 secondary schools on different islands, 60 plus early childhood programs, an extension and outreach program which branches to the continental US and awards 24 million dollars in scholarships complemented by a post high counseling program. He formerly served as Dean of Zayed Univ. in the Middle East, Dean of the Sch. of Human Ecology, Univ. of Wisconsin, and Head of the Family Social Science Dept., Univ of Minnesota.

The Prevention of Targeted Violence in Schools, Bryan Vossekuil; Robert A. Fein, Ph.D.

The Secret Service through the National Threat Assessment Center identified 41 incidents of school shootings since 1974 in which the school was specifically chosen as the site of the attack and where serious injury or death occurred. An analysis was conducted of the preincident thinking and behaviors of the attackers in order to provide accurate and useful information that might help law enforcement and school officials identify earlier, persons at risk of attacking and intervene more effectively in those situations. Through reviews of investigative, school and court records and interviews with attackers, their planning behavior, target selection, motives, communication patterns and the process of ideation to action were explored. In this presentation two case studies, study findings and their implications will be discussed.

**Bryan Vossekuil** is a recently retired Special Agent of the U.S. Secret Service. Currently he is a consultant to the Secret Service's Natl. Threat Assessment Ctr. as co-director of the Secret Service Safe Schools Initiative. He is also director of the Natl. Violence Prevention and Study Ctr. In his over 20 years with the Secret Service, he carried out a variety of responsibilities including service on the Presidential Protective Detail and in the Intelligence Div. He has consulted and spoken widely on the identification, assessment, and management of persons who might pose threats of violence. He has served on the Dept. of Justice/ National Criminal Justice Assn. Resource Group that developed a model anti-stalking code and has worked with numerous federal agencies as they developed systems for dealing with threatening behaviors. He is coauthor of several books regarding assessment of violence.

**Robert Fein** is director of the Natl. Violence Prevention and Study Ctt. and a consultant to the U.S. Secret Service's Natl. Threat Assessment Ctr. He has much experience as a forensic psychologist at several facilities, and worked with the U.S. Secret Service, reviewing and consulting on protective intelligence cases. He is co-author of several books and articles on assessment and prevention of threats. Recently he has served as co-director of the Secret Service Safe Schools Initiative. Dr. Fein holds appointments at the Harvard Medical School, and the Univ. of Massachusetts Medical School.

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## How to Make the Most of the Conference

#### How to Prepare Before You Leave Home

#### Review the Printed Program Carefully

- Note all of the sessions you would like to attend. Highlight your "must sees." Look at the Subject Index on page 5 for presentations that fit your interests. Be sure to bring your Printed Program with you to the Conference; additional copies cost \$4.50.
- Rank the presentations you want to attend. Try to schedule Section membership and committee meetings as well as receptions and parties. Be sure to include appointments you want to make. Write your final choices on your Personal Schedule Planner in the pullout section.

#### Make Networking Plans

- Ask colleagues to introduce you to people you would like to meet.
- \* Prior to the Conference, schedule appointments with those people you would like to meet at the Conference. Read their books and articles for ease in conversing with them.
- Bring return address labels or print your name and address on a sheet of peel-off labels so you can quickly attach them to sign-up lists and order cards.
- Bring along business cards to hand to exhibitors, presenters, and new friends. If you bring a laptop or electronic calendar, copy the addresses, phone numbers, and e-mail addresses of new colleagues.
- Pack copies of your resume for colleagues and the Employment Matching Service.
- The NCFR Conference offers a limited number of volunteer positions. Many student aides at NCFR Conferences have become active members after this experience. If you work 8 hours, half of your Conference registration fee will be refunded after the Conference. - Register **before October 1** so that you can review Program materials ahead of time.

#### Miscellaneous Notes

- For emergencies, leave the telephone number of the hotel, your schedule, and NCFR's number with your family and colleagues.
- Select clothes that create the image you want to project at the Conference. This is particularly important if you are using the Employment Matching Service. Also include clothes for exercise and all types of weather.
- Allow space in your luggage to bring home copies of papers, books, and flyers.
