

Women with children often have ongoing exposure to abusers after separation as they make decisions about custody and share in parenting. Keep Physically Fit, Mentally Alert, and Safe

* Try to get enough rest during the conference. Fatigue is predictable so take time to rest, exercise, and unwind.

Contact hotel staff immediately if you see anything suspicious. 5) Memorize how you unpack your things and where you place them. Lock and store suitcases in closet. When re-entering your room check to be sure no one is there. 6) Leave valuables in hotel safe deposit boxes. 7) Be alert to people behind you when using cash machines.

Miscellaneous Notes

* Leave the Hotel telephone number and your schedule with your family and colleagues for emergencies.

* Frequently check for messages at the Message Board, and you room phone flasher.

* Select clothes that create a professional image but are comfortable. Include clothes for exercise and all types of weather. Allow luggage space for bringing home added items. Remove restricted objects if not checking it.
