


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

Special Update for Researchers and Practitioners Implementing a Large-Scale Evaluation of Marriage and Relationships Skills Education: Progress of the Building Strong Families Project



M. Robin Dion is a Senior Research Psychologist at Mathematica Policy Research in Washington, D.C. Currently she is principal investigator for the Building Strong Families project, a large-scale demonstration and rigorous nine-year evaluation of multiple programs to support healthy couple relationships among unwed parents with young children.



The Building Strong Families (BSF) project is the nation's largest and most rigorous evaluation of interventions to improve relationships among low-income unmarried couples with children. The project was motivated by earlier research findings that at the time of their child's birth, most unmarried couples report having loving relationships and aspirations to marry, but that many soon break up. The BSF intervention includes guided group sessions addressing common couple issues, as well as one-on-one support and referrals to other needed services. More than 5,000 unmarried couples have voluntarily enrolled in the BSF study at sites in seven states and been randomly assigned to a program or control group. The conference presentation will describe the intervention, including the relationship skills curricula on which it is based, as well as the progress of the evaluation, addressing such questions as who participates, the extent of their involvement in program services, and couples' responses to the intervention. It will also explain how BSF was implemented, including how host sites were found and the processes used to identify and recruit couples. The evaluation will assess the impact of the intervention on relationship quality and status, family well-being, and children's social, emotional and cognitive development, a preview will be given of analysis plans as the evaluation proceeds with its follow-up of families 15 months and 36 months after they enter the evaluation sample.

Paul Amato is Distinguished Professor of Sociology and Demography, the Pennsylvania State University. He is also a past Program Chair and Section Chair of NCFR and winner of the 2008 Burgess Award and Reuben Hill Award.

Observers disagree over whether children's well-being is improving or declining in the United States. Broad statements about children's well-being are problematic, however, because well-being is a multidimensional construct, and not all indicators have changed in the same direction. Karen Hansen is Professor of Sociology, Brandeis University, Waltham, Massachusetts

Americans love to think of themselves as independent and selfsufficient. Families in turn, reflect that imagined glory. According to prevailing conceptions, families "go it alone;" they rely on no one. Even though the U.S. Census Bureau documents parental reliance on numerous people and institutions in childrearing, the data remain largely invisible in popular conceptions of child care and in social science theoretical framing of childrearing. This paper explores the "secret life" of interdependence via in-depth case studies of networks constructed to care for school-age children. Each network operates by a class-shaped logic of reciprocity that is premised on obligation. Members of these care-giving networks navigate structural constraints, assess each other's commitments, needs, intentions, and capacities in light of their own, and experience reciprocity as an expedient asset and a nagging obligation.



Kenneth Hardy, Professor of Couple and Family Therapy at Drexel University, College of Nursing & Health Professions, internationally known for his work with diverse and oppressed families, will examine the complex interplay between race, reality, and our relationships. Therapists and other practitioners who work with members of racially oppressed groups often are often challenged by the presence of invisible wounds. These wounds are the culmination of ongoing experiences with injustice, degradation, and discrimination. Lack of awareness and sensitivity to the wounds of oppression can impede practitioners' work with oppressed clients. Innocent acts of insensitivity are often unspoken, unacknowledged, micro-acts that contribute to the premature termination of intervention and the perceptions that oppressed people are resistant to help.

This special session will examine the anatomy of racial oppression and its impact on the life experience of those targeted. It will explore the multitudinous ways in which therapy and other family work potentially replicates acts of oppression for clients whose life experiences have been maligned by prejudice and discrimination. Strategies for uncovering and addressing the invisible wounds of oppression will be discussed. Participants also will be encouraged to explore the ways in which their personal experiences with oppression both enrich and constrain their work as family therapists and practitioners. Strategies for conducting effective cross racial dialogues, and for promoting an authentic climate of inclusion will also be discussed.





- Little Rock's Old State House was constructed of handmade brick in 1836, served as the state capitol for 75 years, and continues to inspire citizens and visitors alike as a history museum today. It is the oldest standing state capitol building west of the Mississippi River.
- Arkansas has the only active diamond mine in the United States.
- Famous Arkansas residents: Maya Angelou, author and poet; Daisy Bates, social reformer; Glen Campbell, singer; William Jefferson Clinton, president; Dizzy Dean, baseball player; John Grisham, author; Douglas MacArthur general; Scott

composer; Billy Bob Thornton, actor; Sam Walton, founder of Wal-Mart; Scottie Pippin, basketball player.

- The Big Dam Bridge, which rises to 90 feet above the Arkansas River in Little Rock, is the longest pedestrian and bicycle bridge in the world at 4,226 feet.
- It is illegal to mispronounce Arkansas while in the state. It must be pronounced "Arkansaw."
- Since the 1830s the area now known as Hot Springs National Park has bathed notables as diverse as Franklin D. Roosevelt, Babe Ruth, and Al Capone. The park is entirely surrounded by the city of Hot Springs.
